THE STORY OF GILWELL PARK

How It Has Given Impetus To The Scout Movement—Area was gift of Scot Who Wanted to do His "Good Turn."

About three years ago a gentleman approached the Chief Scout, Sir Robert Baden-Powell, and said: "What can I do that will help scouting?" The chief replied, "Give us a training ground of your own."

A short time afterward Gilwell Park was decided to be the Scout's training ground in Essex, on the borders of Epping Forest. The area was given to the Scout Movement by a Scot who wanted to do his "good turn."

Mr. Hunter announced that an agreement had been completed with the British government whereby desirable settlers would be sent to Australia and he said that the transportation expenses of the selected immigrants would be paid by the two governments. There has been much discussion in both countries about adding to the population of Australia, and announcement of an agreement is deemed of the utmost importance to Australia.

Sir Mark Sheldon said before he sailed that he believed Australia could find places almost overnight for at least 100,000 more settlers, and expressed the opinion that the island continent, slightly larger in area than the United States, ultimately could find room for at least 1,000,000 population, "or even more than the United States." He added that he believed that the present population of 5,000,000 inhabitants of the commonwealth were for a white Australia, "despite the remarks of any politician."

He referred to the remarks of Sir Henry Newman Barwell, premier of South Australia, on the possibility of importing negro labor into the commonwealth.

Mr. Hunter said that before leaving London he had conferred with arrangements with the British government on lines laid down by Prime Minister Hughes of Australia and Senator Millen, who was minister for immigration.

"This agreement," Mr. Hunter said, "virtually amounts to a co-partnership between the British and the Australian governments for the proper exploitation of the land of moving population from the overcrowded to the sparsely settled sections of the British Empire."

"At present about 3,000 migrants a month are leaving England for Australia. It is intended shortly to increase this number to 100,000 a year. In a territory slightly larger than the United States, capable of producing any product grown on earth, Australia has a population of only 5,000,000."

"All white persons prepared to work on the land are welcome here, but the Australian people are determined to maintain a racial purity. At present the population is thirty-seven per cent British, and it is desired to preserve this idea. Americans are more than welcome, and will be met on conditions of entry, nor, after settlement, to any discrimination."

"The Australian government knows what it wants with regard to immigration restrictions, and it goes about it with refreshing directness and simplicity. The people who are barred simply cannot get in, and those who are admissible are passed with trouble and inquiry beyond an intelligent medical scrutiny."

O., of Fredericton, and Major H. R. Mercereau, of Montreal; four daughters, Mrs. William J. Scott and Mrs. Harry F. McLeod, of Fredericton; Mrs. Victor Dodds, of Brandon (Man.), and Mrs. John C. Yess, of Ottawa; three brothers, J. Y. of Chatham; Percival, of Boston, and Gail, of Rimouski, and one sister, Mrs. Sara M. Mercereau, of Boston. There are ten grandchildren. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30.

CUPID'S COURT OPEN FOR RIVAL WOOLERS

Qualities of Lovers' Union Petitioners to Be Set Forth at Hammonont, N. J.

Hammonont, N. J., Aug. 21.—Cupid's Court will convene here soon for the first time. The court is the judicial end of the Lovers' Co-operative Union, founded here recently with the idea of bringing together men and women who want to marry. One of the founders and secretaries is Thomas B. Delker, correspondent of Metropolitan and other newspapers. Flooding in upon Mr. Delker and his associates since first they launched their project have come 2,000 applications from those who feel that they need help in accomplishing one of the principal businesses in life. The court in twenty sessions will pass upon twenty-four applications of men who want to meet, woo and win women clients of the union.

Lewis S. Conley, president of the organization, will advocate the merits of one suitor, then Belker will plead that a man he champions should get preference at a hearing to be given two weeks later. A jury of three Hammonont women and three Hammonont men, assisted by six persons from Philadelphia, Newark, New York and Pittsburgh, will hear "Solitors" Conley and Delker and pick the winner. In the event of a tie vote by the jury, "Cupid," in the person of Mrs. Helen Lon Rodgers of Hammonont, will have the deciding vote. If, however, the jury should deem neither man worthy of the honor, it will have the right to reserve decision and order that the two men concerned be brought before it for inspection and interrogation at a hearing to be given two weeks later. In this event, the woman concerned will be invited to be present, but her presence will be unknown to the rivals for her hand.

After a Check-Up on References.
After the jury has rendered a decision the woman in the case will be notified, and the two references sent in by the suitor will be furnished to her. She will be advised to investigate these references immediately, and if they are not satisfactory, to notify the secretary. If no such notice is received by the secretary within two weeks the man will be supplied with the name and address of the lady concerned and he will be admonished to "get busy."

One of the most interesting applications was that of a man who had been a member of a Kentucky club, not yet of voting age, who has matured ideas of the kind of woman he would like to marry. In describing her ideal she specifies as follows:—
