Rules and Regulations,

For the Government of Pilots in the County of Charlotte. Made and approved by the Commissioners, appointed under Act of the Legislature, passed the 2001.

which shall be painted in black figures of receiving any fee or gratuity for any services not less than 36 inches in length in the on board such vessel shall be subject to and main-sail and jib; each pilot boat to be properly fitted out for such service; to be mot less than 10 tons burthen, and to be exclusively employed in the business of pi-

loting.

III.—No pilot to be entitled to any fee or reward for pitoting, unless he resides with in the County aforesaid, and shall be owner or part owner, or shall have a recorded interest or standing in a pilot boat. And no person shall receive a Branch unless he skall have served his apprenticeship with a Branch pilot in a pilot boat for four years for that purpose; and no person shall receive an apprentice, or be entitled to fees as a Branch Pilot, if he himself, or his boat, is employed in the coasting trade, or in any other business than that of piloting, between the first day of April, and the fitteenth day

other business than that of piloting, between the first day of April, and the fitteenth day of Discember follwing.

IV.—Any pilot demanding or receiving any greater sum for pilotage than the rates hereinsfer mentioned, shall pay a fine of five pounds with costs, to be recovered before a Justice of the Pesce—one moiety of the fine to be paid to the County Treasurer for the use of the County, and the other moiety to the prosecutor.

V.—Any pilot taking charge of a vessel either inward or outward bound, and leaving her within the piloting grounds contrary to the wishes of the Master, to pay a fine of five pounds, to be recovered and applied as in Art., 4.
