can Car Foundry Co The work of building these cars will be done at the Reid Companys car shops, and 'all the material, except the trucks and steel framework will be local. Several carloaads of lumber are at the other end of the line waitingg to be brought in here to be trimmed and put in readiness

for use. \* The work of building all these cars will mean the employment of many extra hands, and the shops will be running full time duringg the whole of the summer. It is expected to have the cars in readiness to meet the increased rush of fall traffic. There are also due here shortly number of new boilers, fire boxes and other material, which will be used in thoroughly renovatingg sev eral of the older engines of the older

engines of the railway company, and this will mean increased employmen for a large number of men in th locomotive shops also.
