THE NEEDS OF CUBA.

Mass Meeting in New York Urges

Reciprocity With the Island.

Reciprocity With the Island. NEW YORK, Feb. 19.— Cuba's needs, and what this country should do to prosper the Island whose free-dom it accomplished, were set forth tonight at a mass meeting in Carnegie hall, by promineff speakers of both political parties. At the close resolu-tions were adopted endorsing a reduc-tion of at least 50 per cent in the ex-isting duties on Cuban products in re-turn for an equal concession on the part of Cuba on products imported from this country. General Stefart L. Woodford, whu was ambassador to Spain before the war, occupied the chair. 'The speakers of the evening were E. M. Shepard, Edward Lauterbach and W. Bourke Cockran. The call for the meeting was signed by such men as Abram S.

Edward Lauterbach and W. Bourke Cockran. The call for the meeting was signed by such men as Abram S. Hewitt, Wm. E. Lodge, W. D. Howells, R. W. Gilder, John G. Carlisle, Oscar S. Straus, Benj. F. Tracy, Cornelius N. Bliss, General Stewart L. Woodford and Frederick R. Coudert, jr. General Woodford laid stress upon the advan-tages of securing the trade of Cuba, which he said could not be had except by proper concessions to her. "Cuba will need meats," said he, "Is she going to take them from South Africa or from us? She will need manufacturing iron. Are we going to supply it? Last year the Cuban im-ports amounted to more than \$66,000,000 and more than half of it she took from clear across the sea." General Wood-ford concluded his speech with a plea to the audience to remember the last speech of President McKinley in which he advocated reciprecity with foreign countries.
