THAWING WATER PIPES

Electrical Method Works Successfully in Moncton-It is both Cheap and Expeditious.

the cutouts, was an ampere meter which indicated the capacity of the apparatus. About two hundred amperes are needed to thaw out a pipe successfully. The one used on St. George street did not have the required capacity. It was a spare one, however, belonging to the city, and was tried only as an experiment. With a trans-former possessing sufficient capacity the work could be done more quickly than by any other method. It is also estimated that with the proper apparatus the use of electricity, would effect a saving of from twenty-five to thirty dollars, in time and labor, over the use of lime in thawing out one service. It would also be more economical than the hot water method. It is es-timated that the electrical method would cost on an average about four dollars. From ten to fifteen minutes would be required for a half-inch pipe and about half an hour for an inch and
