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
SWING OUT FOR WAR


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EXAMS. WILL COMMENCE **TOMORROW**

The departmental examinations will begin in the High School building to-morrow morning. The Normal School entrance, the superior class Heense, junior matriculation and leaving exjunior matriculation and leaving examinations, which are the exams, to be written, will be in progress from Tuesday morning until Friday afternoon of this week. There are eighty nine students who will take the Normal School entrance examinations, thirty seven of which will take the first division exams, forty five the second, and seven the third. Thirty six students will try the matriculation exams, and there are eighteen applicants for the superior school license examinations. Acting Inspector William McLean, together with several school teachers will conduct the examinations. Two gold medals are offered for the matriculation exams, one for the highest aggregate marks, the other for the highest in mathematics.


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
