**KINGS COUNTY JURY
 WANT CHANGE IN LAW**
 They Favor Amendment Pro-
 viding that Grand Jury
 Should be Called Only When
 There is Work to Do.

Hamilton, N. B., March 21.—The
 March Circuit Court for Kings County
 opened this morning. Mr. Justice
 White presiding. Twenty-one grand
 jurors were present and Mr. W. D.
 Gillis was chosen foreman, especially
 His Honor in his charge, expressed
 his gratification at the fact that there
 was no criminal business to be
 brought before the court, and espe-
 cially so as he was a Kings County man,
 and Kings County, with its large popu-
 lation and varied interests, made it a
 source of regret that he had to do
 so on the two occasions of presiding
 over the court, a pair of white
 gloves from the Sheriff of the county.
 He referred to the fact that the grand
 jury need not confine itself to criminal
 matters, but could present anything
 which in their opinion tended to the
 welfare of the people of the county.
 He thought it, however, somewhat a
 matter for reform that so many busy
 men should be taken away from their
 homes and business, where there was
 no business to be done, and that
 really little or nothing to call for their
 deliberations. He rehearsed the rea-
 sons held by some of the older judges
 for the continuance of the practice,
 but gave his opinion that none of these
 were sufficiently potent to warrant
 the continuance of the practice.
 The next matter was a call from
 Woodstock to Rev. Frank Baird, of
 Sussex. The call was supported by
 Messrs. Brown and Stratton, of Wood-
 stock, showing that the call was heard
 by the congregation had not been cited it
 was decided that the Presbytery meet
 in St. John April 5th, where all parties
 will be heard.
 Judge Forbes read a communication
 from Lord Strathcona, promising \$2-
 000 to Pine Hill College, on condition
 that \$5,000 were raised by the Synod.
 His Lordship's offer was favorably
 commented on, and steps will be taken
 to raise the amount required by the
 Presbytery.
 Rev. W. R. Rainnie reported on the
 various matters set down by the Gen-
 eral Assembly.
 P. Campbell, presenting the report
 of the treasurer, said the balance on
 hand was \$97.
 James Ross reported a list of stand-
 ing committees for the ensuing year.
 The report of the Committee on
 Moral Reform, presented as the appoin-
 tment of a commission by the provin-
 cial government for the enforcement
 of the Canada Temperance Act in the
 different centres. This was along the
 same lines as the City of Fredericton
 bill now before the legislature. There
 was considerable discussion regarding
 the enforcement of the Scott Act, a
 number of eulogiums expressing the
 opinion that owing to different local
 influences that existed in different cen-
 tres, the law was not enforced as it
 should be.
 Rev. Frank Baird stated that the

law was a grand success in Sussex.
 Judge Forbes quoted Rev. Albert

 The discussion regarding the Scott
 Act matters and its enforcement un-
 der the municipal methods was dis-
 cussed.
 A section of the report dealing with
 moving picture shows was also taken
 up. It was resolved that parents in
 consultation be asked to warn their
 children regarding the dangers of at-
 tending moving picture shows.
 The report of the Committee on Moral
 and Social Reform was adopted as a
 whole by the assembly.
 May Not Return.
 Mrs. James Miller, accompanied by
 her daughter, Miss Elizabeth, left for
 the South on Saturday. Since they
 have broken up their home here they
 have no definite plans for returning.
 After a short visit to New York they
 will proceed on a visit to Charleston,
 S. C., and some of the other Southern
 cities, and during the summer they
 may visit the Pacific coast.
