ASK FOR CITY SCHOOL

BUILDINGS TO USE AS

SOCIAL WORK CENTRES

Play Grounds Association Delegation Accompanied by John Bradford, of Amherst, Call on School Board with Request--Mr. Bradford Tells How Plan has Benefitted Amherst.

The idea of having the school build-
ings utilized as social centres was dis-
cussed at a joint meeting of the School
Trustees and members of the Play-
grounds Association yesterday after-
noon, a meeting at which many of the
school principals were present. The
Trustees seemed favorable to the idea
and at the conclusion of the discus-
sion the chairman, R. B. Emerson,
stated that they would make known
their decision in a short time.

After the meeting was called to
order Chairman R. B. Emerson said
it had been called at the instance of
the Playgrounds Association, and that
he had asked the principals of the
city schools to attend to hear Mr.
Bradford.

A. M. Belding said it was the in-
tention of the Playgrounds Associa-
tion to ask for the use of one or more
of the city schools to take up the idea
of utilizing the school buildings as
social work centres, and that he had
asked the principals of the city schools

Mr. Bradford Explains Plan.

John Bradford explained that the
idea of utilizing school buildings in
cities originated with Dr. Ward, who
had been brought up in a rural dis-
trict where the little red schoolhouse
formed the centre of the social activi-
ties of the communities. He said one
of the first cities to take up the idea
was Rochester, and went on to de-
scribe the various features of the so-
cial work which had been carried out
there.

The school buildings, he said, be-
longed to the taxpayers. There are in
every city a large number of people of
limited education. After a demonstra-
tion of the value of social centres work,
the school boards have invariably
taken up the work. In New York
last winter, the school boards had ar-
ranged for lectures in the evening,
which were attended by 2,000,000 per-
sons.

Mr. Bradford said there were dis-
tricts in St. John where the people
were evidently poor and had few so-
cial pleasures, and he argued that
reading clubs, lectures, games, and
entertainments in the school build-
ings would prove an attraction to them.

Amherst Finds City Good.

"Throughout the city of St. John
you have few open spaces," he added.
"There is need of more open spaces,
city training and recreation. As a re-
sult of the introduction of games, etc.,
in Amherst, the regular school work
of the children has increased fully 50
per cent. The question of discipline
was solved. The teacher was brought
into a new relation with the pupil. One
great trouble now was the gulf be-
tween the school and the home. In
Amherst, the children got their parents
to the school buildings and entertain-
ed them there by games, songs, and
exhibitions. The school teachers got
an opportunity to meet the parents on
a new footing. When the idea of entertainments for
the parents was mooted, the people of
Amherst said it was a good idea, but
nobody would attend. The prophets
were disappointed. At the first gath-
ering the hall was crowded and every
meeting has been well attended. The
heart of the school work at the high-
land school at Amherst for two
months last winter was \$85.


In reply to Trustee Bullock, Mr.
Bradford said the educational class
work in the evening was only open
to children over the school age; the
entertainments were open to all.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL IN

QUARTERLY SESSION

Interesting Papers Heard Yes-
terday--Mrs. Dennis Tells
of Work of the Council in
Halifax.

The quarterly meeting of the Wo-
men's Council was held at the head-
quarters of the King's Daughters'
Guild, on Chipman Hill, yesterday af-
ternoon when besides the routine busi-
ness several interesting papers were
read.

Mrs. T. H. Bullock, the president of
the council, presided, and after the
routine business had been disposed of,
Mrs. Bullock read a paper on the
work done at the annual meeting of
the Women's Council of Canada, which
was held at Toronto, during the past
summer. This paper proved of value,
as it dealt with the work as carried on
in other cities.

Mrs. Dennis, president of the Hal-
ifax council, then read a paper which
was listened to with great attention
by all present, as it dealt with the ad-
vanced work of the council of the sister
city, the civic and social branch
being thoroughly described.

Two other papers of interest were
read during the afternoon one by Miss
Audrey Bullock on the "Care of Milk"
and the other by Miss Jessie Lawson
on "Sanitation."
