ASK FOR CITY SCHOOL BUILDINGS TO USE AS SOCIAL WORK CENTRES

Play Grounds Association Delegation Accompanied by John Bradford, of Amherst, Call on School Board with Request—Mr. Bradford Tells How Plan has Benefitted Amherst.

The idea of having the school buildings utilized as social centres was discussed at a joint meeting of the School Trustees and members of the Playgrounds Association yesterday afternoon, a meeting at which many of the school principals were present. The Trustees seemed favorable to the idea and at the conclusion of the discussion the chairman, R. B. Emerson, stated that they would make known their decision in a short time.

After the meeting was called to order Chairman R. B. Emerson said it had been called at the instance of the Playgrounds Association, and that he had asked the principals of the city schools to attend to hear Mr. Bradford.

A. M. Belding said it was the intention of the Playgrounds Association to ask for the use of one or more of the school buildings for social work.

Mr. Bradford explained the plan of utilizing school buildings in cities originated with Dr. Ward, who had been brought up in a rural district where the little red schoolhouse formed the centre of the social activities of the community. He said one of the first cities to take up the work was Rochester, and went on to describe the various features of the social work which had been carried out there.

Mr. Bradford said the school buildings, he said, belonged to the taxpayers. There are in every city a large number of people of limited education. After a demonstration of the value of social centres work, the school boards have invariably taken up the work. In New York last winter, the school boards had arranged for lectures in the evening, which were attended by 2,000,000 persons.

Mr. Bradford said there were districts in St. John where the people were evidently poor and had few social pleasures, and he argued that reading clubs, lectures, games, and entertainments in the school buildings would prove an attraction to them.

Amherst Finds City Good.

"Throughout the city of St. John you have few open spaces," he added. "There is need of recreation, of social training and recreation. As a result of the introduction of games, etc. in Amherst, the regular school work of the children has increased fully 60 per cent. The question of discipline was solved. The teacher was brought into a new relation with the pupil. One great trouble now was the gulf between the school and the home. In Amherst the children got their parents to the school buildings and entertained them there by games, songs, and exhibitions. In St. John, the school teachers got an opportunity to meet the parents on a new footing. When the idea of entertainments for the parents was mooted, the people of Amherst said it was a good idea, but nobody would attend. The prophets came to the surface, predicting that the hall was crowded and every meeting had been well attended. The cost of the work at the school buildings was not more than the cost of the land school at Amherst for two months last winter was \$85.

In reply to Trustee Bullock, Mr. Bradford said the educational class work in the evening was only open to children over the school age.

COAL OUTPUT AT SPRINGHILL.

At the Springhill collieries the output from the first of January to the end of October was 345,307 tons, and for the same ten months of 1911, 194,958 tons, an increase of 150,349 tons for 1912. The combined output of the Cape Breton and Springhill collieries for ten months of this year totals 4,192,000 tons. For the first ten months of 1911 the tonnage was 3,517,000, a gain for the present year of the large total of 675,000 tons.
