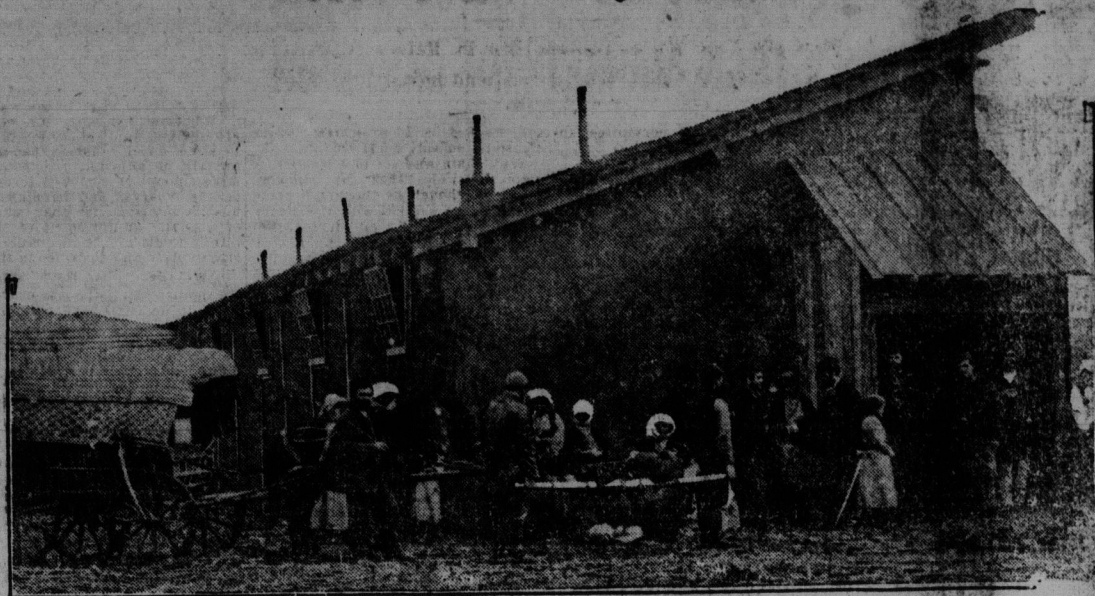


Photos of War and Horrors of War Taken on Bloody Balkan Battlefields

BRITISH PRESS COMMENT ON BORDEN'S POLICY

Nothing Could be More Statesmanlike than His Plan — A Proposal which will Make History — The Imperial Sentiment of More Value than Money.

What the British Empire Means.
(The Times, London.)
The gift of three Dreadnoughts, striking and significant as it would be at any time, will carry a greater significance in this moment of grave international strain. The world has not yet understood what the British Empire means; but it is beginning to understand today that as a weight in the scales for peace its power and influence are unparalleled.

Canadian Prime Minister made it clear that Canada required the re-establishment of British sea-power in the Atlantic and Pacific, and that the British Admiralty had assented thereto. The ultimate aim is one Imperial Fleet, and a necessary corollary — one Imperial voice, directing the policy which that fleet will exist to support.

Additions, Not Substitutes.
(The Pall Mall Gazette.)

The ships are intended, not as substitutes, but as additions to the provision which it is the duty of the Home Government to make for the naval defence of the Empire. The

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visions will be equally valuable whether, in fruition of our hopes, the great Imperial Navy comes to birth, or whether, through failure to take occasion by the hand, the Empire is compelled to fall back upon the feeble alternative of separate though allied navies. Canada, at any rate, will do her duty.

A Plain Strong Man.
(The Observer, London.)
A plain, strong man of Scottish descent has spoken words and has willed a deed which may be decisive of the history of the world for more years than we, our children, or our grandchildren shall see. The peddling minds which only discern in Mr. Borden's announcement the gift of three Dreadnoughts to the Mother Navy, and straightway fall to work to discuss whether these shall be in substitution for, or in addition to, those built by the Mother Country, show themselves utterly incapable of rising to the height of this great argument. The history of the future may class the uprising of the British Dominions among the greatest events of all time.

No more wise and fitting step could have been taken towards the evolution of that great Imperial mind and will which must eventually be developed if the Empire is ever to be more than a sentimental abstraction than the offer of the Home Government of a seat on the Committee of Imperial Defence to a Minister of the Canadian Government.

An Epoch Making Proposal.
(The Daily Chronicle, London.)
It is hardly necessary to repeat what we have said before, that the Imperial value of such offers exceeds their money value. Three Dreadnoughts voluntarily provided by a Dominion are worth more to the Empire and the Fleet than the same ships provided by the British taxpayer. They are so because they prove in the most practical way a concern, and to the other world as well, that the base on which our naval strength is founded is not merely insubstantial Imperialism. They emphasize both our defensive resources and our peaceful intentions. Foreign Powers will take note that our command of the sea does not rest alone upon the wealth and spirit of the people in two small islands; they may also be assured that our Overseas Dominions, which have no conceivable interest in quarrelsome adventures, would not contribute to our navy, if they did not regard it as the handmaid of an essentially aggressive policy.

The Sentiment of Empire.
(The Daily Mail, London.)
No policy could be more statesmanlike or patriotic than this, nor could it have been proclaimed in nobler and more moving words. They will ring throughout the world as a declaration that the Dominions stand side by side with the Mother Country in the great task of assuring the command of the sea. In this new era of intense and ever-growing naval competition, they are ready and willing and proud to join in bearing the burden of Imperial defence.

County W.C.T.U. in Quarterly Session.
Reports Telling of Progress Received at Meeting of Women's Christian Temperance Union Yesterday.

The quarterly convention of the St. John County W.C.T.U. was held yesterday afternoon in Union Hall, Main street. The meeting was confined to the routine business of the union, no new matters being brought up for discussion.

Members from the different branches in the city were present, namely, Carleton, Fairview, North End and what is known as the St. John branch, and the business transacted by each branch during the term was discussed. The different reports were read, showing the W.C.T.U. to be gaining in strength. Several new members have been added during the term. With an increased membership the Women's Christian Temperance Union has branched out and taken a more active part in the welfare of the city.

The meeting yesterday afternoon was opened by a reading of a passage from the Bible by Mrs. Dr. Hutchinson. The speaker of the afternoon was Mrs. L. A. Curry, who delivered an interesting lecture in behalf of Women's Suffrage. In the course of her lecture Mrs. Curry contrasted the position taken by the women in Canada in aid of the cause with the tactics adopted by the upholders of the cause in England.

A question of particular interest to the members of the Women's Canadian Club will probably be brought up at the next meeting of the club, when the decision of the executive regarding the admission of foreign ladies, temporarily residents of the city to the privileges of associate members of the club will be laid before the club.

At a recent meeting of the executive it was decided to grant the privilege of associate membership to American and other foreign women, who, although not Canadian or permanent residents of this city, are making their home here for a certain time. There are a number of such whose husbands are employed on different works, some for a period of a year, two years and even longer, and as many of these desire to enjoy the privileges of the club, the executive at their recent meeting decided to grant this privilege, if it meets with the approval of the club.

According to the constitution of the club it is impossible for these ladies to become members, but if the action of the executive is sanctioned they can become associate members, that is they will be privileged to be present at the lectures and other gatherings, but are not entitled to vote or hold office.

This action of the club if adopted will no doubt meet with general approval, as there are many in the city who will thus benefit by it, and will be permitted to participate in the exceptional privileges which the club holds out.

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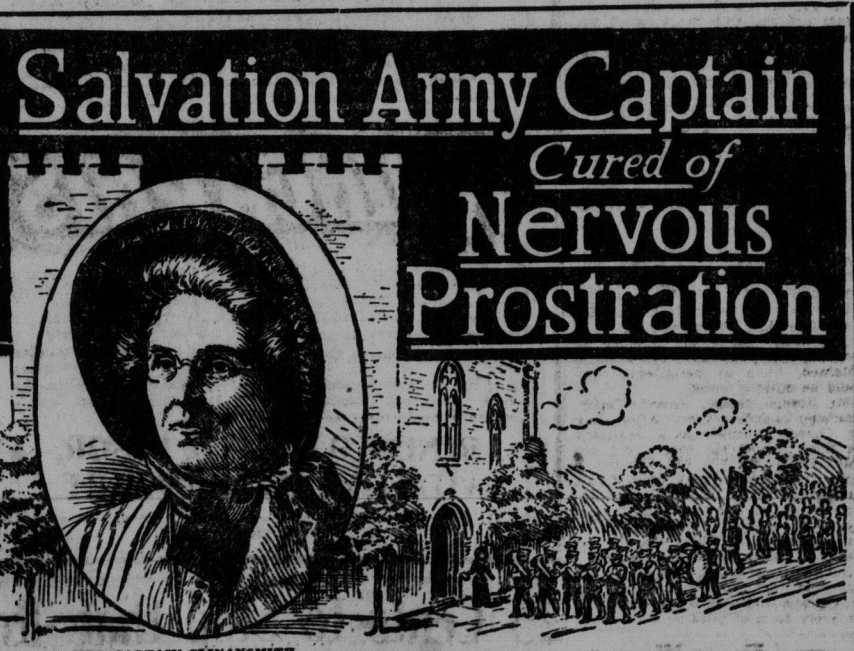
