

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—An order has been issued by the railway commission permanently approving the standard tariff of tolls of the Bell Telephone Company for Canada. 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those for the whole of Canada, have been temporarily approved, generally for half a year at a time, with pro-vision made for rebates in case over-charge was found. This was done pending a period when the whole question could be taken up by the board and adjusted. The latter has now been done, in effect however, by an order isued this after-noon and forwarded to Montreal per-manent approval was given the tolls, except for some few exceptions. This will be of subject to complaint by the public when the matter may be rought up any time. The standard tariffs are the maxi-mum ones which are used as a basis for framing the special tolls or locat ones which are generally lower. Be-yond its maximum tariffs the company may not go but if it wishes to fit lewer and pleased to graciously approve of such action, not to speak of the gen-eral public.




