Hospitals for ordinary allments and for infectious diseases, a dispensary and several small libraries have been el-ther specially erected or established in houses already standing in the neigbhorhood and lent for the purpose by charitable people. The camp is under a Dutch military gruard and besides the company of 150 soldiers a small detachment of county police and Belgian gendarmes. Tools necessary to all the ordinary trades are provided and several small huts in each villages are fitted up as workshops.
