ulent form. Preliminary symptoms

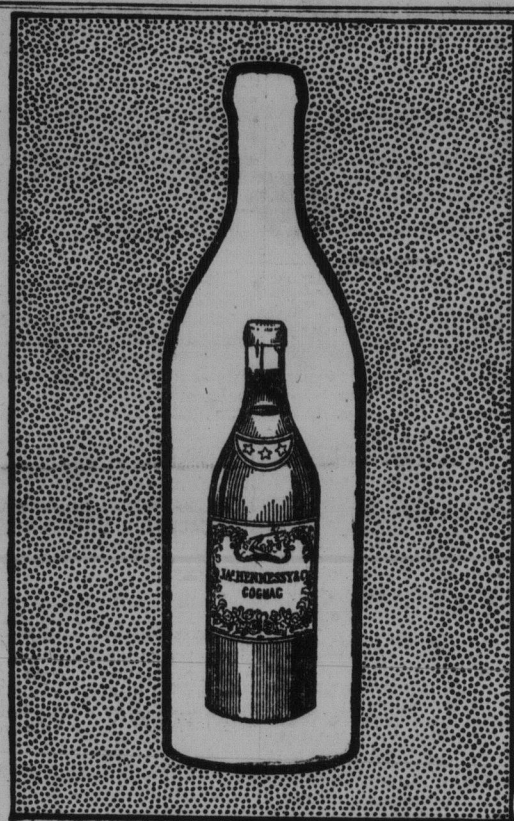
are now observable at most of the col-
