Japanese Count Resigns From The House of Peers

Count Yaugiwara Disgusted by His Sister Poetess Aikiko

Tokyo, April 23.—(Special.)—Refusing to recognize the modern Japanese law which relieves the head of a family of responsibility for the conduct of its members, Count Yaugiwara, brother of the poetess Aikiko Ito, whose famous divorce case startled the empire, has resigned from the House of Peers and gone into seclusion.

The little poetess, already divorced, created a sensation last year when she suddenly married Mr. Ito, coal king of Kyushu, although she was known to be a young literary man named Miyakami, whom she met at the home of Mr. Ito before her second marriage.

Thinking his sister would now settle down, Count Yaugiwara, who recently married Mrs. Ito, began to take an active part in the affairs of state. He represented Japan abroad on several occasions and was regarded as one of the leaders of the party in the upper house of parliament.

But the temperamental poetess soon proved that she was far from settled in her rich surroundings. Society and political circles were started last October when she suddenly left the palatial residence of her husband while the latter was on a business tour, and went to her lover, Miyakami, in whose home she was found several weeks later.

Every effort of her brother and his powerful friends to induce her to return home proved fruitless, whereupon the case was laid before the imperial government with a plea that Aikiko be granted a divorce in order to permit a legal marriage to Miyakami.

The imperial household, however, declined to interfere on the ground that it would have a bad effect on the discipline governing noble families, and its desecration Count Yaugiwara and his wife arranged to depart, which resulted in the kidnapping of the girl from the home of her lover and the keeping of her whereabouts secret for the past several weeks.

In resigning from the House of Peers, Count Yaugiwara authorized a statement that he always had been identified with a plea that Aikiko be granted a divorce in order to permit a legal marriage to Miyakami.

Conditions in The Caucasus Reported Most Terrible

London, April 23.—Advises received here from the American Near East Relief organization at Tiflis depict terrible conditions in the Caucasus, where starvation, pestilence, and the towns, severe weather and attacks by wolves are causing great distress.

The central government is making every effort to secure food supplies from Persia and Turkistan and several small shipments have arrived from Persia, but the difficulty is to find a means of getting them to the Caucasus.

Migrations of starving peasants from the villages owing to the exhaustion of food stocks and the loss of their flocks are reported in the Caucasus. In the town of Yerevan, fifteen hundred of them have arrived at Alexandropol, where the Near East Relief organization is feeding 5,000 refugees and 20,000 orphans.

WILSON SHAKES FOUNDATION OF HIS PARTY

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Lady Astor Urges Every Woman To Enter Politics

Mother of Six Children and First Woman in Parliament Electrifies New York Audience

New York, April 23.—Nancy Langhorne Astor, the Virginia girl who married a British nobleman, became the mother of six children and afterward was the first woman in the House of Commons ever held by a woman, came back to America today for a short visit.

First she chatted lightly on a dozen topics, and then tonight she spoke seriously on women and politics, urging every woman to enter politics.

The gathering of men and women who crowded Town Hall to hear her speech tonight showed with a fervor that bespoke their admiration for Lady Astor's achievements.

Lady Astor accompanied her American wife from England on her "this downward career from home to the house." Her husband, she explained, was a born social reformer, but he had avoided the pitfall of thinking one can right wrongs with philanthropy.

One sex cannot govern alone, she declared. She believed one of the reasons civilization had failed so lamentably was that it had had one-sided government.

"Don't let us make the mistake of ever allowing that to happen again," she said. "I am conscious of nothing worse than a man-governed world, but I can see the combination of the two going forward and making civilization more the name of civilization based on Christianity, not force; a civilization based on justice and mercy."

In entering politics, Lady Astor said, women are up against generations and generations of prejudice. She counseled them to begin their political development by putting their hands on the foundation—local politics.

She made it clear that she did not mean that every woman should go in for a political career. But the women, she said, could be certain when casting their votes that they were casting them for what seemed most likely to help the true majority and not bolster up an organized majority.

Mercifully, she declared, women have no politics of their own. They are in for a political career. But the women, she said, could be certain when casting their votes that they were casting them for what seemed most likely to help the true majority and not bolster up an organized majority.

"Ever since woman's consciousness has looked beyond the material," she said, "men's consciousness has feared her vaguely; he has gone on her for inspiration, he has relied on her for all that is best and most of her life, yet by sheer material force, he has limited her. He has, without knowing it, westernized the harem mind of the east. I don't believe he knows it, yet we must break it to guide, his mother and his better half. But we must prove to him that we are a necessary half not only in private life, but in public life."

Lady Astor said she faced the hope that women of all countries would do their duty and raise a generation of men and women who will look up on war and all that leads to it with as much horror as we now look upon a cold blooded murder.
