A few weeks ago was noted in the columns of The Transcript an action brought by J. B. Bedford of Windsor against the estate of the late A. D. McGugan. It was said that Bedford had been awarded \$180 damages, but s Judge Dromgole of Windsor, who had reserved judgment, gave his decision ast week, non-suiting the case and dismissing the action with costs. The facts of the case are these:

Bedford attended a sale of pure bred Holstein cattle held by the late Mr. McGugan in April, 1917, and purchased a cow. "Houwtje Cornucopia Maid." for \$180, giving his note for the same. Bedford accepted the cow when it was shipped to him, kept it, and finally haid the note. In September, 1918, seventeen months after getting the cow. Bedford entered an action against the estate of the late Mr. McGugan for \$500 damages, claiming that he did not get the cow bought.
