## Two Foreigners Taken in Custody at Guelph

MURDER BEING INVESTIGATED BY DETECTIVE MILLER

Guelph March 31.—Alex Dutki an Ukrainian died this morning at the General Hospital as the result of three bullet wounds in the lower part of his body received in a murderous attack which took place in the foreign section of the city, on Alice street, late last night. Another Ukrainian named Mike Mandubura, is in the hospital suffering from a badly cut head when he was hit by a bottle, a short time previous to the shooting and was robbed of over \$100. Gambling, with an entire absence of liquor appears to be at the back of the deed.

John Nasadek, an Austrian, living on Ontario Street, was held by the Police the former being arrested last night and the latter this afternoon. Both are said to have been together Provincial Detective Miller arrived, this afternoon and took charge of the case.

Dutki was shot between 148 and 150 Alice street the latter house being occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Mallot. From evidence gathered last night by Chief Randall it appears that there had been a card party at Mallot's during Sunday afternoon and evening and that the murdered man had been there, although it was said he was not taking part in the game. Mike Mandubura was also there and during the progress of the game he produced his money belt showing a roll of over \$100. A short time after he showed his wealth the card players went outside, and it was then that Mike was hit over the head with a bottle and his wealth taken from him. He was taken into the Mallot house where Mrs. Mallot bathed his wounds, and a short time after this was taken to the hospital.

Shooting a Mystery. Just what happened while the other men were talking outside is not known, but at any rate they were not there very long before the shots rang out and Dutki received his death wound. He was rushed to the hospital and everything possible done for him, but he passed away this morning on the operating table while the doctors were probing for the bullets.

Those who were at the Mallot card party were Mr. and Mrs. Tom Mallot, Rae Burdette, an out-of-town woman who is visiting there, and Frank Bayless Manni Boim Lugie Aven and John Baladya, besides the murdered man and anybody.

When arrested Dasadek protested his innocence and stated he had seen another man shoot Dutki three times. He didn't know who the man was, how he hit on the head with the bottle identified Dasadek as having threatened to shoot earlier in evening. The overcoat worn by Nasadek when arrested was covered with blood, Handly burro also stated that Dasadek is the man who went through his clothes after he was struck with the bottle.

Inquest Opened. All those who were at Mallot's yesterday were summoned to Magistrate Watt's office this morning and were closely questioned by Col. MacDonald. Immediately after word had been given out that Dutki had died Colonel Dr. H. H. Otton started to arrange for an inquest and Constable McElroy impounded the following jury: A. Malcolm foreman; Norman MacDonald Fred B. Kelly T.D. Gemmell J.D. McArthur G. Wallace and J. Benson. At 11 o'clock this morning Dr. Otton, end, my viewed the body of the murdered man at Lavell's morgue and they adjourned until next Monday evening at 8 o'clock at the police station.

## Daylight Saving Outlook is Said to be Good

ALL CIVIL SERVANTS IN CANADA ORDERED TO CONFORM TO MUNICIPAL ARRANGEMENTS

Ottawa March 31.—The prospects for national daylight saving seem brighter. The fact that the Government has ordered 80,000 civil servants throughout Canada, to follow the new time where ever it is in operation, and advises that nearly every city in the country has adopted it, leaves the remaining question up to the railway commission. To-morrow the railways will be called on to show cause for the change. They will be able to show cause and likewise effect if what they seek is denied.

The belief to-night is that the railways having embarked on the plan in conjunction with the States will not be stopped. If not there will not likely be federal legislation on the subject but will mean the application of the system on lines about as broad as last year.

Discussed in House. Ottawa March 31.—In the House of Commons this afternoon Mr. Lemieux asked that the intentions of the Government were in view of the adoption of daylight saving by several municipalities and by the railway war board.

Sir Thomas White: "The civil service of both inside and outside departments has always conformed to both local and municipal regulations. Therefore, so far as the service is concerned in the matter of time it will, so far as possible, conform to local time as established by municipal regulations. With regard to the sessions of Parliament which now begin every afternoon at 3 o'clock except on Wednesday, when they begin at 2 standard time, it has not yet been intimated to the Government what official action will be taken by the City of Ottawa on the question of time-tables, which comes before the board to-morrow. The House will, therefore, meet to-morrow by standard time. After we have received official information of the action taken by the City of Ottawa and the decision of the board of railway commissioners, I shall announce the course which the Government has to suggest with regard to the meetings of Parliament having regard to the convenience of members."

## Erie Man Killed

"SANDY" WOODS MEETS DEATH WHILE UNLOADING COAL FROM BOAT AT ERIE

Bienheim March 31.—"Sandy" Woods a valiant employee of Lake Erie Coal Company at Erie met death by accident there this morning. He went to the top of the coal hoist as the machinery was being prepared to unload the steamer Bessemer N. 1 which had just arrived from Conneaut his purpose being to let down the heavy steel boom into the boat. There was a heavy wind and he used his foot to push it out and start it down. For some reason there was no one ready below to stop it at the proper place and it came down with such force as to break the support to which Woods was clinging and hurl him to his death 80 feet below. He died after two hours. He is survived by a young widow and three children.

CHATHAM March 31.—"Sandy" Wood, employee of the Lake Erie Coal Company at Erie who died this morning as a result of injuries sustained in a fall of 80 feet from a coal hoist on the coal boat Bessemer, had been employed by the coal company for several years and was regarded as a competent workman. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wood of Bienheim. He is survived by his widow, and six young children and one brother, who is overseas.

Cotner Hanks of Bienheim who was called has decided to hold an inquest on Thursday night.

SHORT WORDS WILL NO LONG-ER SUFFICE

WASHINGTON, April 2. (By Robert J. Bender).—President Wilson has started to shake the lethargy out of the peace conference. He has the support of Premier Lloyd George in his effort.

With this information available to-day, it is possible to state that the President is desirous of getting action and results now, even if it is found necessary to shoo away the European chancellors. He has tried soft words, applying the well-known "salve" and wheedling. He was applying these in abundance early as last July, but they have proved unavailing.

## Catholic Clergy Being Persecuted in Russia

20 Bishops and Hundreds of Priests Killed.

AND A NUMBER OF CHURCHES DESTROYED.

ROME, April 2.—The Observatore Romano today published an interchange of correspondence between Pope Benedict and the Bolsheviks regarding alleged persecution of the Catholic clergy in Russia.

Archbishop Silvestre, of Omsk, appealed to the Pope to issue an official protest, stating that 20 bishops and hundreds of priests had been murdered and mutilated and a number of churches destroyed.

The Pope sent a wireless to Premier Lenin imploring him in the name of humanity to stop these excesses. Foreign Minister Tshitcherine replied that all Russians are equal and accused the priests of hoarding food.

## Syndicatists are More Extremethan Spartacans

ARE FOMENTING REVOLUTION IN BAVARIA.

LONDON, April 2.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times reported today that "syndicatists, who are more extreme than the Spartacans," are fomenting a revolution in Bavaria, with headquarters at Munich.

The Krupps have closed their Munich factory, throwing 4,000 out of work.

## A Returned Soldier Was Elected Alderman

BY ELECTORS OF VERDUN, QUEBEC.

MONTREAL, April 2.—Verdun, Quebec, elected the first returned soldier as alderman in Canada last night, when it voted so overwhelmingly for Sergeant James K. Bacon that his opponent lost his deposit.

Bacon was over age when he enlisted but insisted going to the front because his son, who was under age, had been discharged and he insisted his family be represented. Bacon Jr. re-enlisted when turned 18 and is still overseas.

Alderman Bacon was twice wounded, invalided home and returning last year was partially paralyzed from shell shock, which renders him unable to follow his occupation as a blacksmith.

## Serbia and Jugo Slavia Proclaimed Republic

LONDON, April 2.—The newspaper Vetcherni Listy of Agram, (Jugo-Slavia), announces that the dynasty of Kara Georgevitch has been overthrown.

ELORA IS ANXIOUS FOR EXTENSION OF RAILWAY

GUELPH, April 2.—A delegation from Elora, consisting of the Reeve of the village and the clerk of the township, came to Guelph Tuesday to interview the city officials on the proposed electric extension from Hespeler north to Mount Forest by way of Guelph.

Elora is anxious to have connections with Guelph, and is willing to guarantee bonds covering the cost of the extension to Elora. Nothing definite was arrived at, however, as the project is only in its initial stages here, though the prospects seem good for an electric railway to Hespeler this summer, operated by the C. P. R. as an extension of their Galt and Hespeler branch.
