Thus they are prepared to believe whatever their church, their priests, and their religious books may teach, however unreasonable and opposite to all their perceptions. They are prepared, also, to distrust in general their own senses, and their own reasons, and to receive any absurdities, which cunning and wicked men may wish to impose upon them.
