CONGRATULATIONS must be extended to all those who

have helped to give Canadian Football a start at the University of New Brunswick. The cries of those who said the attempt to organize Canadian Rugger would fail have been Ladies' Society: quieted by the large and enthusiastic turnout in pre-season training. An exhibition game has been arranged with Dalhousie University of Halifax here next month and, judging by the spirit of the players, it seems certain that the Red and Black should give the Tigers a battle all the way.

Canadian Football owns a position in the extra-curricular activities of the University of New Brunswick. It's the national football game and aside from any ideas of patriotism the game is good enough to have an 87% backing of the student body. The organizers deserve much credit for the uphill battle they have waged in overcoming such difficulties as finances, lack of competition, student coach and no intercollegiate affiliations.

These obstacles have not as yet been surpassed. The Hillmen at the present time are not members of an organized league nor does it seem likely that they will have such an opportunity. The \$800.00 spent on uniforms has cut extensively into their own budget. However, their enthusiasm has not been dampened, but on the contrary, invigorated. Many of the players came back early to participate in preseason training and they are quite confident that theirs is the only game.

English Rugby is Canadian Football's main opponent. The brand of the former has been criticized by many Upper Canadians, in particular, who compare Canadian Rugby as played in the Professional Big Four with our Intercollegiate Rugby. Undoubtedly many of these critics have not seen Rugby League as demonstrated by top English, New Zealand or Australian teams. If these enthusiasts play a class of ball comparable to that of the Allouettes and Argos then English Rugby will take a back seat. To accomplish this will require sound coaching. In the Canadian game a player enters a contest knowing his every move as prescribed by the plays devised by his coach. In Rugby league the player receives training only in the fundamentals. The play is dependent on the individual. When U. N. B. meets Dalhousie the success of their venture will rest mainly on the quality of the coaching received. Will the pre-arranged plays of the Canadian Footballer be more interesting than the personal initiative of the Rugby player? This will be decided on two fateful days next month when the Canadian Rugby squad tackles Dalhousie and the English team meets St. Dunstan's.

We wish both teams every success (wouldn't two good teams be better than one). We also hope that the rivalry between the two factions will not cause friction which would be injurious to our college spirit.


