## HRH PRINCE PHILIP:

## Religion of science supercedes God

Scientists must make themselves responsible for the environmental effects of their discoveries, HRH Prince Phillip, the Duke of Edinburgh, said in Mississauga last Wednesday.

Thousands of Mississaugans thronged to Sheridan Park Research Centre to catch a glimpse of Queen Elizabeth's husband as he toured the snow covered buildings.

The Prince warned that there could be a "growing mass of schizophrenia and the erosion of the natural world" if the "new religion of science" continued to be at variance with the religion of God.

He described the over 100 scientists at the research centre as "one of the most powerful neo-religious sects in the world," citing only economists, as being stronger.

He s,a i d economists "seem to be building up the same sort of dogma and shibboleths which became the milestones of old religions."

FORMULA

He said the explosion of science had encouraged the view that "everything in this world and universe can be reduced to a rational arrangement of facts or figures, that even human behavior can be juggled and organized into some sort of satisfactory

Prince Phillip said he wanted to make it clear that he was in favour of

science discovering as many facts as possible, although he had reservations concerning the relationship of science and human existence.

He said the Sheridan Park programs were motivated by industrial and commercial considerations, which was "wholly reasonable."

"The difficulty with all this is that there appears to be no motivation for scientific research related to the central concern of this world, which is the quality of existence, the interpretation of all living things."

## CHEMICALS

He said science produced "a whole armoury" of chemicals for different purposes in agriculture and forestry, but it was the layman who first sounded the warning about their indiscriminate use.

It was the layman, too, he said who first drew attention to the dangers of water and air pollution.

He said the problem was to ensure that tendancies were disclosed before crises built up.

"The concern is with the truth. .and it turns out it is that truth which can be conveniently ascertained or which promises some practical reward that gets all the attention." he said

"Who feels even remotely responsible for the quality of our existence except as a means of gaining votes?" he asked.

He said in many ways science had taken over from religion in the sense that science claims to provide the factual answers to all the questions which makend had been asking since it learned to speak.


He added: "but people are people, with all the ancient and complex behaviour patterns, responses and the combinations and recombinations of intellect and

Prince Phillip suggested that one answer could be for the old religions to set up scientific research organizations. He said, it could be better still to establish a working alliance between the new religions of science and economics and the old religions of

He said the high priests of science had an immensely more important and far-reaching responsibility than simply discovering facts and exploiting them in the short-term interest
