

that high." (The underlining is added in order to draw attention to Mr. MacNicol's suggestion that the information given to the Minister of Justice was incorrect, so far as Long Lake was concerned).

4. Mr. MacNicol's statement makes it clear that he had in mind the question of changes taking place between Canada and the United States as to permitting the opening of the gate in the canal south of Long Lake.

5. The records of the Department have been re-examined and it is possible to state the following conclusion, with confidence:-

(a) There is no record on the files of this Department as to anything further having taken place in reference to the Long Lake-Kenogami diversion, following the letter of the Secretary of State of the United States of March 17, 1938.

(b) No person concerned with the developments as between Canada and the United States, with regard to this matter, is aware of any developments since March 17, 1938.

(c) Mr. MacNicol refers to the two White Papers. In the second of these White Papers, being a supplement, there is the text of a communication from the Prime Minister to the Premier of Ontario, dated March 21, 1938,
