ORDINATION SERVICE IN C. E. CATHEDRAL.

Yesterday the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland in his Cathedral administered the Sacrament of Holy Order in the presence of a large congregation assembled to witness the solemn rite. On the Revs. C. A. Moulton, T. Guavett, E. Hunt and D. S. Bailey was conferred the dignity of the priesthood. An eloquent sermon was preached by the Rector of Heart's Content, Rev. Canon Smart, and Rev. Canon Bolt assisted the Bishop as chaplain. These two presbyters with Canon White joined with the Bishop in the laying on of hands, that forms such a striking feature in the rite, and there were many prayers for blessing on the newly ordained priests. At St. Thomas's Church in the evening Mr. Moulton, who is curate there, performed his first sacerdotal acts by giving the absolution during the office and pronouncing from the altar the Benedictus in the name of the Blessed Trinity at the close of the service, at which service he also preached an interesting and forcible service.

The other clergy will return to their respective missions, Rev. E. Hunt to Coley's Point, Rev. D. S. Bailey to Port de Grave, Rev. T. Guavett to Cow Head, Bonne Bay; though the latter has gone first to Harbour Grace, this morning, when he will for the first time offer his first Eucharist on to-morrow morning at old St. Paul's in that town.

The S.S. Kolfund, 18 days out from Cardiff arrived here to-day to load codfish for Naples. She had stormy weather on the run to port.

THE SUSU HERE

The S.S. Susu, Capt. Roberts, arrived here from the North at 7 p.m. to-day with a full cargo of fish, oil &c. The little ship had it very stormy on the run North, experiencing gales of wind, high sea, rain and fog, but made all ports of call going and coming. She reports some snow falls at Seldem and other places North. Her passengers were Messrs R. W. Ritcey, R. Collins, J. W. Perry, A. Miller, J. R. Whiteway, Messdames Jones and Goodyear, and Misses Jones, Collins and Gate and 24 second class.

BECOMING A NUISANCE

During the past week at night electric pocket lamps are in evidence everywhere. To grown ups they may be of some service, but hardly a youngster is met with who does not possess one and they are fast becoming a nuisance. They are flashed in the eyes of pedestrians and they unnecessarily illuminate the streets. It is likely the police will put a stop to the indiscriminate use of these.

HAS SIXTY-EIGHT WHALES

The little whaler Cachalot up to Saturday last had captured 68 whales. The weather the past week or 10 days has been very stormy and this has greatly impeded her in her work. There are now some 600 barrels of whale oil at Hawk's Harbour awaiting shipment to St. John's.

The S.S. "Eagle" left here this morning for Sydney and will return with a full freight for the Reid Nfld. Co.

German Attacks Are Repulsed by French

PARIS, Oct. 22.—Violent counterattacks by Germans north and south of the Somme, were broken down by barrage fire of the French. The Huns did not reach the French lines at a single point. In an action north of Blaise wood the French took 250 prisoners. There has been heavy bombardment all along the front, especially on the right bank of the Meuse. The Germans made use of liquid fire in the Somme attack in the region of Blaise wood, but were repulsed everywhere with heavy losses.

Early Winter Looked For on Russian Front

LONDON, Oct. 22.—There is every indication that winter will set in very early on the Russian front. According to despatches from Petrograd snow has been falling thickly in the Russian capital during the last two days, and there have been several snow-falls in the Carpathians. In Roumania, however, the war theatre, which is just now attracting most attention, the probability is that there will be some weeks yet of good campaigning weather.

Ponsonby, M.P., Resigns His Seat

LONDON, Oct. 22.—Arthur Ponsonby, M.P., Private Secretary to the late Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman, former Prime Minister, has resigned his seat owing to the unpopularity of his advocacy of peace negotiations some months ago. Ponsonby attacked the Government in the House for allowing diplomatic etiquette to stand in the way of peace pour parlers.

Norge Shipping Losses Daik Growing

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Lloyds report the following Norwegian ships sunk: Steamers, "Dido," 232 tons and the "forty-Fulvo," the latter without warning, the barque "Cotteca," the barque "Guldas," the "Cock-of-the-Walk," and several barges. KRISTIANIA, Oct. 23.—The Norwegian steamer "Ronnang," 1331 tons, has been torpedoed by a German submarine. The crew are saved.

Paper Suspended

PARIS, Oct. 23.—The Journal des Debats publishes a despatch dated from Zurich stating that the "Tages Post," of Stettin "has been suspended for this announcement: 'The submarine "Bremen" was torpedoed in an American port after having safely passed the Irish Coast and avoided all ambushes of the British.'

RECEIVED UGLY FALL

Saturday night while passing along near Rawlin's Cross a man named Smith tripped and fell over the kerb in the darkness, his head striking the ground with great violence. He was picked up in an unconscious condition by those about, Dr. Cowperthwaite was called by phone, quickly restored him, after which he was driven home. His injuries were not serious.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

Mr. F. J. Morris, K.C., presided to-day and discharged three drunks and a disorderly. Another, an old offender, was sent down for 29 days. Sgt. Byrnes summoned a man for driving a motor car without a license and also for driving after dark with lights showing. He was fined for each offence \$5. Const. Tobin summoned the heads of four mercantile houses for unlawfully having electric and gas lights lighting on their premises after dark. One of the firms was fined \$10, and owing to certain irregularities in two other summonses the cases were withdrawn but will come up for hearing later. Another of the parties was fined \$5. The defendant in an assault case was fined \$1 or 3 days. Two men were charged with stealing \$10 worth of lumber owned by Mr. Gosse of the Cove Road. Owing to the lack of sufficient evidence to convict the case was dismissed.

LOST FOUR OFFICERS

The ranks of the C.C.C. have been sadly thinned of its members as a result of so many of its officer members volunteering. Most of them have been wounded at the front and several have been killed, both in Gallipoli and France. At least four of its most prominent officers have made the supreme sacrifice, namely, Captains Donnelly and O'Brien, and Lieuts Summers and Shortall, the latter commanding the Holy Cross Companies.

MOVEMENTS OF SHIPPING

Mr. LeMessurier, C.M.G., had the following messages to-day: The schr. John Parker arrived at Gaultois to land codfish. The S.S. Cranley sailed from Botwood Saturday with 5,600 tons pulp and paper and 150 lumber for England. The schr. Gossip loaded codfish at Bellemar for Gloucester. The schr. Wilfred Marcus is loading for Oporto at Grand Bank. The Duchess of Cornwall entered to load fish at Catalina. The schr. Caruso Giovanni left St. Lawrence for Halifax with 1,533 qtls of codfish. The schr. Pinta arrived at Port Saunders from Gloucester bound to Nipper's Harbour.

U-53 REPORTED SUNK

We hear to-day from a gentleman well up in Government circles that a financier who recently arrived from the United States had a wire while at Sydney saying that U-53—the sub which sunk the Stephano and other ships—had been sunk by a British Cruiser on the Atlantic.

THEY ISSUED SCRIP.

Owing to the great shortage of 50-cent pieces and other small denominations of silver money some of the mercantile firms Saturday had to issue scrip for the odd money which was due their help. It is almost impossible, as we stated, to get any large amount of small change.

WILL MAKE ANOTHER TRIP.

Though it has not yet been definitely decided to do so, it is likely the Reid Newfoundland Coy. will send the Sagona another trip to the Labrador. There is a good deal of freight down on the coast, fish, oil, etc. to be shipped south, and it would be a good idea if the ship were sent along again to get this up here.

HE SUFFERED MUCH.

This morning a man named Noseworthy arrived in the City from Pouch Cove, ill of acute appendicitis. He came up in a buggy and how he survived the drive in his condition is a mystery. He was sent to Hospital in care of Mr. E. Whiteway for an immediate operation.

ROME, Oct. 20.—Italian forces have occupied the town of Liaskovika on the south-eastern frontier of Albania, the war office announced to-day.
