Bay Halifax Co. is one of the three residents of that community perished by drowning on Monday. They are Thomas Boutillier, Alexander Martin and Robert Martin, the two latter being brothers. Their smashed, overturned boat came ashore in the surf yesterday and definitely confirmed the fears that had been aroused by their absence for several days.

The three men had gone out to haul their nets off shore. At first there was not much alarm over their non-return as the weather being squally and the distance the boat had gone from the bay being about three miles, it was thought they might have put in to some cove along the shore. But on Wednesday their failure to return confirmed the fears that they had been drowned, in the heavy seas running on Monday, and all doubts were set at rest by finding the boat yesterday.

Thomas Boutillier was about 28 years of age, Alexander Martin was 30 years of age, and Robert Martin 15. Mr. Boutillier's parents are living and an aged father survives the Martin boys. None of the bodies have yet been recovered and owing to the gale which has swept the coast the last three days, little attempt could be made to search for them.

Lies on Bottom of the Annapolis

Digby, October 20.—The schooner E. Mayfield, with a cargo of 60,000 brick for the St. John Sugar refineries; lies at the bottom of the Annapolis river, submerged, twenty feet at low water. Captain Burton Merriman, who owned and sailed the schooner and his three young sons, who formed the crew, had a close call from watery graves, getting away in the boat as the vessel was going down. The youngest son, a mere boy, was snatched from his sleep in a bunk just in the nick of time. The Mayfield left the brickyards of the Nova Scotia Clay Works before daylight on Sunday morning, using only motor power. The engine broke down and this left the vessel at the mercy on the ebb tide. The Mayfield struck one of the new ice piers in the middle of the river, making a gaping hole in the hull, and after remaining afloat five minutes went to the bottom off Allen's Creek. The captain and crew lost all their belongings. Much sympathy is expressed for Captain Merriman, who was well known here and all the Bay of Fundy ports. He is having lots of trouble this year. Recently he was the loser in a heavy law suit at Parrsboro, his home town, and his wife now lies at the point of death in Parrsboro. There is very little, if any, insurance on the vessel.
