Three Quarters of a Million.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 29.—The terrible famine which has raged in central China for several months is now virtually over; the crops planted with the seed distributed by the relief committees are being harvested; the missionaries who we labored so assiduously in the cause of humanity are gradually coming to the coast for a rest, and people are beginning to count the cost in lives and money The exact number of Chinese who perished will never be known, but the estimate recently made by a prominent member of the relief organizations, judging from conversations with many workers, was very much exaggerated. He computed lion, but on going carefully into the facts it is found that the famine tion turned fully upon his formulæ, being laster less than eight months, and at the worst period the deaths were said to average 3.000 per day, so that even had this figure been maintained for the full period of the famine the total mortality would have been less

> The smallest estimate is three times the maximum death rate in the area affected, and this would give nearly half a million deaths. These figures are a fair estimate of the toll exacted by the scourge. It may be said in short, that the famine has not claimed anything like as many victims as was predicted would be the case. This is due in great measure to the prompt way in which funds were subscribed; and the manner in which foreigners, chiefly missionaries, who could speak the Chinese language spoken in the central provinces of the empire, responded to the call for workers.
