THE TRAMP NUISANCE.

With the advent of cold weather the vagabond army begins to concentrate in and about the larger towns and cities. During the warm days of summer these gentlemen of leisure paid their respects to the farming community, ever sure of a meal and a place to rest at night.

But cold weather they dislike just as much as they do cleanliness, and hence the tramp gravitates citywards or takes up his winter quarters in some comfortable jail. A few weeks more and they will honor the Maple City with their presence, although—be it known—Chatham is no longer to them a "soft layout," to use an expression of their own. But, despite laws prohibiting the soliciting of alms on the streets and the commendable vigilance of our energetic police force, it is carried on to a large extent. One has only to visit the outlying residential thoroughfares to see the professional beggars plying their trade. And many make more than the average honest working-man. The earnings of an "industrious" mendicant are said to run all the way from 50 cents to \$2 a day. Very seldom is it less than the former or more than the latter. But this is not all, for they manage to get enough to eat and the money more than keeps them in drink, while the Police Station assures them of a bed, provided they can pocket their repugnance to the cleansing process, which all must go through preparatory to retiring.

How best to deal with these pariahs is a problem that seems almost as far from a satisfactory solution as it was ten years ago. Tramping as a "profession" in this country dates from about the close of the United States civil war. It has been steadily increasing ever since, until to-day the vagabond army is numbered not by hundreds, but by tens of thousands. They have well defined routes on which they travel. Certain railways are patronized more than others, as being easier "worked," and the same holds good of certain cities and towns. At one time this city of churches was one of the easiest worked in the province, but since the more stringent methods adopted by Chief Young and his officers, it has been by no means such a "soft spot." This is well and there is prospect. The Planet believes, of a further reduction in the near future.

Dr. Holland, in an article in Scribner's Monthly some years ago, said of the tramp: "He has no more rights than the sow that wallows in the gutter or the lost dog that hovers round the city squares. He is no more to be considered in his wishes or his will in the settlement of the question as to what is to be done with him than if he were a bullock in a corral." But although many endorse the opinion of that writer, there are others who do not go quite so far, but believe that many tramps may be reclaimed, and for that reason they should not be dealt with too harshly. But before anything can be done to abate this terrible nuisance, the cause of it must be thoroughly investigated and understood. And this is by no means so easy as one might at first suppose.

A BOMB-SHELL.

Yesterday's Mail and Empire contained an open letter by H. H. Cook, ex-M. P., a Liberal of the Liberals—which every Canadian, Grit or Tory, ought to read and ponder over. Mr. Cook has no axe to grind; he is not leaving his party; he has had no personal cause for resentment against his party leaders; he is not a disappointed office seeker; he has asked for no favors; he will not join the Conservative party. His letter is the plain statement of an honest man, written with the hope of opening the eyes of the good men of his party and showing how they are drifting rapidly away from Liberal principles and from the principles of honor and honesty. It is written by a man who keenly feels the rapid degeneration of his party, and hopes to rescue at least some brands from the burning. It is written in sorrow, not in anger, by one who feels it to be his duty as an honest man, and as a man who has during his whole public career, been one of the strongest supporters of the Liberal party, and one of the strongest fighters for the Liberal principles which have been trampled under foot by the present party leaders.

Mr. Cook's letter is a far-reaching and thorough exposure of the hypocrisy, mendacity and reckless wastefulness of the Laurier-Tarte government. Coming as it does from a Liberal of the Liberals it carries weight which the statements of political enemies lack, and which must recommend it to all as a fair and truthful statement of the condition of affairs existing at Ottawa.

Mr. Cook is well known in Canada as a zealous Liberal. He was defeated in East Simcoe last election. In 1882 and 1887 he was successful in the same riding. He remains a Liberal and therein is the value of his criticism of the government. His letter is a history of the shortcomings of his party, as seen

Ocean Laundry.
An "ocean laundry" is an experiment, first to be tried on the steamship New England, of the Dominion Line. The usual practice with an ocean liner is to allow its own laundry to assume large proportion somewhere down in the hold, while the soiled linen of its passengers becomes an individual care and trouble until the end of the voyage.

The passenger will now give his linen to the steward, and from the laundryman below, in a few hours, it will be returned to him fresh and clean. The new plant will handle on an average of 7,000 pieces of linen a day, with the capacity for doing the entire washing for about 800 people. It will be as complete as a laundry on shore. The plant has a daily consumption of fifty barrels of soap and twenty barrels of starch.

One item is the use of 4,000 gallons of water per day, which is condensed on the ship by special apparatus. The machinery of the plant consists of a large steam mangle and washing and ironing machines. Napkins and towels can be "fed" to the mangle machine at the rate of 4,000 pieces an hour. There are two large washing machines, which, by skilful manipulation, can turn out linen, well washed and wrung out, to the number of 10,000 pieces a day.

Washing is the first consideration in the process of laundry work, and the success of the results from these machines are assured. Appliances include those for starching properly and to suit individual tastes. One of the most difficult operations of the laundryman is ironing. In the machines which have been provided, however, this part of the work may be done with entire satisfaction. One machine is capable of ironing from 8,000 to 10,000 collars and cuffs a day, to say nothing of other articles.

Secret of Betty Green's Success.
Betty Green was recently induced to talk to a writer for the Ladies' Home Journal of her business methods that have won her sixty millions of dollars or more. The secret of her success is worth knowing: "I don't believe in speculation as a rule," she says, "and I don't speculate as much as people think. When offered so many shares of stock at so much I buy one share and then send it out to see what it will bring. If it's a good advance I buy the rest. If I don't, this was my plan when I used to deal in horses. I would get a day's option on a horse, and see what it would bring before buying it. I attribute my success chiefly to the rule of always buying when every one wants to sell, and selling when every one wants to buy. There's a price on everything I have. When that price is offered I sell. I never buy anything just to hold on to it. Not much! And I try to steer clear of Wall street. Any one who hasn't a whole fortune to back his deals had better do the same. I do everything with all my mind. If there is a lawsuit on hand I go into every detail of it with my lawyer. It's the same with everything else."

Grip Microbes at Home.
Dr. L. Caze contributes an article on influenza to one of the current French reviews.

The modus operandi of the influenza microbe is peculiar. It is not the microbe itself that does the harm, but a poisonous liquid it excretes. A measure of consolation is afforded by the fact that this poison is even more deleterious to the microbe than to the human being in whom it is deposited, for the microbes end by being destroyed by their own exhalations, whereas their victim has many chances of recovery.

The microbe is an egg-shaped thing, but gifted, in spite of its roundness and smoothness, with an extraordinary capacity both of adhering to any conceivable surface and for passing from one resting place to another. Its goal is a human nose or mouth, and once in the vicinity of these organs its future is assured, for the mere act of breathing is sufficient to draw it into the system.

Arrived there it propagates itself with amazing rapidity. It lengthens out, and after twenty minutes of this process, it breaks in twain, and there are two fully fledged microbes in the place of one. In twenty-four hours the original invader will, in this way, be surrounded by a progeny of over 16,000,000 of his poison-producing kindred.

In short, the doctors know almost everything about the influenza microbe except an effective method of exterminating it.

Rat and Elevator.
The greed of one rat caused the fall of a passenger elevator in Minneapolis recently. Savory as strong cheese is the lubricating oil used on the mechanism of the elevator. On the morning in question one of them climbed to the well-oiled pulley above the cage.

Meanwhile four men stepped into the elevator. Alex. Lundeen, the operator, slammed the door and the car started up.

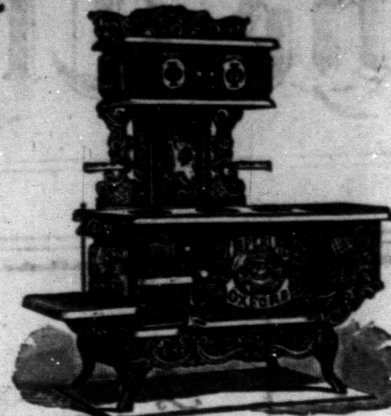
