CHINA AND THE CHINESE PEOPLE ARE NOT DISTINCT ENTITIES

Nineteenth Century and After Review Says That China Has No Unity-Some Reasons Advanced for the Statement That Appear to Be Sound-How the Manchus Have Succeeded in Ruling,

According to the Mineteenth Century and After Review there is no Chinese nation. The Review says: 'We are accustomed to speak of 'China' and 'the Chinese people' as if they were distinct entities. This is an error at the bottom of many of our mistakes and confusions. may use the word China as a conven-

ient expression to connote a certain vast portion of the earth's surface, but in no more exact sense. What figures as China on the map is a number of districts often separated from each other and from the centre by immense distances, differing widely in climate, resources and configuration, inhabited by people of largely varying race, temperament, habit, religion and language.

inhabitants of the central and northern provinces,' says Mr. Keane, 'scarcely regard those of the extreme southeast districts as fellow-countrymen at all.' A native of Shanghai was heard to say Theres were seven Chinamen and two Cantonese. A man from Tien Tsin and a man from Canton can no more talk to-each other than can a Frenchman and a Dutchman. Moreover, there exists between them a virulent race hatred. I lost the best Chinese servant I ever had because, being from the north, nothing would induce him to accompany me in the south of China, where his speech would have betrayed him. 'Cantonese welly bad man, master, he said to me; I go home. This curious inter-hatred is conspicuous where Chinese from different parts meet together, as, for example, in Bangkok, or on the plantations in Malaya, or the Dutch Indies. Savage faction fights are of constant occurrence. Consequently it is easy to raise a force of Chinese in one place to fight Chinese in an

"It is because there is no such thing as 'China' that the military caste of the Manchus, comparatively infinitesimal in numbers, have been able to impose their rule upon the enormous masses of Chinese. it is unwise to predicate anything of China as a whole, or to believe that what suits one part will necessarily

"Over the heterogeneous and con Oicting masses of China there has never been any effectual central control, and what control there has been has steadily grown weaker. The 'Vermilion pencil' makes a faint mark in the south, while in the southwest and extreme northwest it has little but an academic influence, and on Tibetan borders none at all. "Respect this!' appended to every imperial rescript in the Pekin Gazette, is as far from actuality as the 'Oyez' of the usher with us, or the challenge of the Queen's champion at the coronation. There is, therefore, ssibility of the establishment by Chinese authority of a national army, or navy, or civil service. And the corruption which is the fatal curse of China, is directly due to the fact that there is not and cannot be any central authority to exercise control over local officials, or, in the absence of this, to pay The Chinese people, in the language af physics, is a mechanical mixture and not a chemical compound, and therefore it is irresponsive to the action of any single reagent, and incapable of exhibiting any common property."

Deep Planting of Trees.

It is the general experience that deep planting is harmful and con-trary to nature. Trees that are planted deeper than they stood in the nursery row will make vigorous growth for a few years, as the wood covered will send out roots, but the old roots make no growth, finally decay, and sometimes cause the whole tree to die. We consider it very important that trees should not be planted deeper than they stood in the nursery row. Upon this great tower and in this broad and beautiful court there will be seen at night fantastic and beautiful displays in electrical illumination. More than 200,000 electric lamps are to be used for this purpose, it being the intention of electricians to have all the large buildings surrounding this court outlined with fringe of brilliant electric lamps. These wonderful electrical displays are made possible by the nearness of Niagara Falls, from which pearly all the power used for the Exposition will be

WEST VIRGINIA ALERT.

Governor Will Urge Appropriation to flave State Represented.

Governor Atkinson of West Virginia announces that he will embody in his next message to the legislature a recommendation for an appropriation to pay the expenses of the state commission having in charge the state exhibit for the Pan-American Exposition. West Virginia is one of the many states that are inviting capital and labor to come in and help develop their natural resources. With her 15,000 square miles of coal lands, her thousands of acres of hard wood forests. her wonderful stores of petroleum, her iron ore deposits and her great acreage of lands suitable for farming, stock raising and wool growing, she has much to offer in the way of exhibits and much to gain by bringing her resources properly before the world. It is expected that an exhibit will be made showing by maps and specimens, statistics and information f a general character what a new comer to the state may be able to do in the way of advancing the fortunes of himself and those who depend upon him. The millions of visitors to Buffalo next year will be interested in knowing what the possibilities are in all parts of the western bemisphere. The West Virginia commission is composed of Stuart W. Walker of Martinsburg, president; J. C. Morrison of Charleston, secretary; R. B. Battelle of Wheeling, treasurer; James M. Porter, Jr., of New Cumberland and E. E. Smith of Parkersburg.

GUARDING AGAINST FIRE.

Every Precaution to Be Taken at the Pan-American Exposition. There are two fire houses upon the

grounds of the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo, N. Y., which are fully equipped with the apparatus and men necessary to fight any outbreak of fire upon the grounds. In addition to this there are chemical

fire extinguishers in all of the buildings. These are of the same type used at the World's fair at Chicago and are attached to the wall on the interior of the building. A cog on the bearing of the reel releases a valve which turns on the water in case of fire. It is only necessary to unreel the hose and thus turn on a stream which can be directed upon the blaze without a mo ment's delay. In this way every precaution is to be taken to prevent the occurrence of any fire and consequent destruction of valuable property.

Excursions to the Pan-American. All over the country the people are planning to make excursions next summer to the Pan-American Exposition. Clubs are being organized whose members are saving money for the trip in this way. Pan-American study clubs are also being organized. Some large business firms are planning to give excursions to their employees, and in many manufactories the employees are organizing to go in a body to the Exposition. In the large shoe manufacturing concern of Hanan & Sons of Brooklyn the employees, who have organized themselves into an association called the Mutual Aid society, have decided on a five days' excursion to the Pan-American and Niagara Falls and have engaged a special vestibuled train for the purpose. The trip will be made during Independence week. and it is expected that at least 1,000 persons will participate in the jour-

New York Woman Left Her Pet Canine \$10,000.

She was an Eccentric Character, Very Wealthy and Lived the Life of a Recluse.

New York, April 16 .- For the care and maintenance of a little black and tan dog, which lay at her feet when she was dying, Miss Ellen Anne Griffin left \$10,000 by her will. The furnished room in which she died in East Eleventh street was small and plainly furnished, but "Dandy Jim," as the dog is called, wore a jewelled blanket, the only article in the room indicative of the wealth of the woman. Miss Griffin was worth \$150,000, and had for years been a recluse. Her costliest gown was made of calico, and she was a familiar figure in Union Square, where every policeman knew her and her peculiarities. She was the daughter of Charles Alexander Griffin, a prominent New York lawyer 50 years

ago, and the granddaughter of George Griffin, at one time the leading criminal lawyer of New York, and a writer of ability. She was born 58 year ago. Her most intimate friend during her school days was Ella Vanderbilt, granddaughter of Commodore Vander bilt. When a young woman Miss Griffin fell in love with a cousin. Her parents would not permit her to mar-ry him. Her grief over this, which was great, was intensified by the death of the young man not long after. The death of her mother led her finally to take the room near Union Square. She never again saw any of her old friends her only companion being "Dandy Jim" and a canary bird. Last week i ecame evident that Miss Griffin's end was approaching. She sent for he lawyer, and made her will. She ap pointed him her executor, and left he property to her nieces and nephews To Mary Magivney, the housekeeper, Miss Griffin left \$10,000 for the maintenance of the dog until the end of his days.
