DEATH WAS VERY SUDDEN

Mr Brunt Highly Respected Resident Of The 'Burg Passes Away

NOTES FROM GLASS TOWN

Wallaceburg, Feb. 18.—Mr. Brunt, a highly respected citizen of this place, died very suddenly at his home on Wednesday evening. He stopped at six o'clock, up to which time he seemed to be in good health, but was suddenly seized with a pain near his shoulder, which, becoming more and more severe, reached his heart, causing his death. At eight o'clock he had passed to the Great Beyond. Deceased came with his family from England to Canada a few years ago, coming directly to Wallaceburg. He was a man of sterling quality, a member of the Methodist church, and had many friends. He is survived by three sons and two daughters. The funeral was conducted by Rev. Wesley Cosens from his late residence this afternoon at two o'clock. Interment in Wallaceburg cemetery.

NEW DOCK AT RONDEAU

The people of Kent County will be pleased to note by advertisement in this paper that tenders are asked for the construction of a new dock and certain dredging work at Rond Eau Park. Mr. Bowyer has been urging this matter upon the attention of the Government for some time. The estimates for 1906 contained a sum for the construction of a dock, but when Hon. Mr. Cochrane visited the Park last May the local member persuaded him that the sum set apart was inadequate for the work required to make a complete and satisfactory job, so he was assured by the Minister that if he would wait until this year, a sufficient sum would be placed in the estimates to build a permanent dock and also do something to clear up the marsh near the dock.

The plans provide a dock that not only will be permanent but will be a credit to all concerned. We have nothing further to say just now, but feel confident that all interested in Rond Eau Park will be pleased with the work when completed about the middle of July.—Ridgetown Dominion.

NEW EXCUSE FOR MURDER

Evelyn Says Harry Thaw Was Prompted By Providence

MRS. THAW TO TESTIFY

New York, Feb. 18.—Evelyn Nesbit Thaw will be called as the first witness this morning when the trial of her husband, Harry K. Thaw, for the murder of Stanford White is continued before Justice Fitzgerald.

This was announced last evening after an afternoon of consultation between the prisoner, his counsel, and his wife.

It is stated that Mrs. Thaw will tell to-day that Thaw told her, in the hearing of Brynton B. Evans, the alienist, that he had to kill White and that Providence had shown him that was the only way to end his troubles. Thaw's exact words, which it is said she will testify to, and which Dr. Evans will corroborate when he is put on later, were: "I had tried for a long time to put the brute behind the bars, because I thought that was the place for him. I was still trying when suddenly Providence showed me the way to end it. I had to kill him. That was the only way and I did as Providence told me."

The words are regarded as significant as showing that Thaw labored under the delusion that he was directed by a force higher than himself to kill Stanford White.
