TELEPHONE DECISION

Bell Cempany Held te Have Right te Cempensation.

Gettawa, July S.—Judge Hillam of the railway commission yesterday handed out the decision in the lengargued controversy between the towns of Port Arthur and Fort William and the C. P. R. and the Bell Telephone Co. concerning the right of the municipalities to install public-owned telephones in the railway stations, although the Bell Co. has an exclusive contract for the privileges.

The judge holds that the Bell Co. is entitled to compensation for the loss

entitled to compensation for the loss it will sustain for the towns of Port Arthur and Fort William, respectively. The position of the railway company was different.
