Missionary Jubilee.

The Presbyterian Church in Nova Scotia is this year celebrating its mission jubilee. Fifty years ago, Rev. Dr. Geddie set sail for the New Hebrides islands in the Southern Pacific steamer *Henry Wood*.

The result of his work and those who followed him has been marvellous. The island of Erromango is Christianized and the gospel firmly planted on other islands. The work has grown, with new, instead of the cost of maintaining a single missionary, the ordinary expenditure next year, for foreign missions alone, by the Presbyterians of the maritime provinces, will be \$26,000 and there is \$2,000 besides to raise to pay off the balance of debt on the fund.

Part of the jubilee celebration consists of a series of missionary meetings in different parts of the province, at which addresses are delivered and collections asked for towards raising this sum of \$26,000. Rev. Dr. Mackay, the bene of Portmoss, has been addressing crowded meetings in Halifax, and Mr. Wm. Wright, night boy, Allan Simson and D. M. Gordon gave interesting addresses at St. John's Presbyterian church in this town. Rev. Mr. Simson enjoys the distinction of having lived for a short time when very young under Dr. Geddie's pastoral care, and of having been baptized by him. The attendance was not large, owing to insufficient notice of the meeting, but the interest was good and all present felt that they had been profited by listening to the instructive addresses of the visiting clergymen.—*Hants Journal*.

The Strawberry Crop.

The fact that over thirteen hundred crates of strawberries were sent to Halifax on one day last week by the Windsor and Annapolis railway, gives an idea of the extent to which the small fruit industry of the valley is increasing. Each of these crates contained just a bushel of berries, so that one day's shipment amounted to over thirteen hundred bushels. In addition to that a considerable quantity was sent to St. John, Boston, and Lunenburg, on the same day. One would suppose that the shipment of such an enormous quantity would completely break down the market and render them unsaleable. But it seems that such was not the case, as we learn that the lowest sales made were from five to seven cents per quart, which is not below a paying basis for the grower. And it is only when they get down to these prices that they come within the reach of the poorer classes in our cities, consequently a reduction of a few cents per quart in the price means an enormous increase in the consumption.

Without doubt strawberries are our most delicious fruit, the very essence of perfection of all the berries which the earth produces. For this reason the demand for them has kept pace with the enormous increase in the production of the last few years. We think, therefore, that our growers need have no fear about finding a market for them, although the price may occasionally drop pretty near to the line of the cost of production.

Donahoe's Magazine.

Donahoe's Magazine continues to blaze the way to mutual appreciation and honest friendship between Christian Americans, Catholic and Protestant. Its spirit, infused month after month into an ever-growing and enthusiastic constituency, must make for better conditions, social, political, and religious, in this country. Protestant periodicals may well follow the example set by Donahoe's, for with sectarian prejudice and class bigotries clouding the national vision, a clear view of existing political, social, and economic evils is impossible. The last issue of Donahoe's this month is thoroughly in line with the great purpose of the magazine; it bears the title,—"Surviving to find in a Catholic magazine." The "Blessings of the A. P. A." The article itself is more striking even than the title.

It is a fair and fearless exposition of present religious wrongs and political abuses, and will be remembered long after it is read. Another great feature in the July number of "After Death," by Abbe Hogan, of Washington University, in which the position of the Catholic Church regarding the disposition of the dead is stated fully, for the first time, we believe, in an American periodical. There are plenty of light reading, pretty pictures, good poems, and some very thoughtful "Talks to the Type-writer" in this number.

The N. S. government at its last session voted a special grant of \$15,000 for road purposes throughout the province. Of this amount \$945 was the portion due the county of Antigonish, and \$250 of it was spent in purchasing a machine to repair the roads of the county. The machine has been in service in several districts during the past few weeks, and is now in operation at St. Andrews. With eight horses for motive power, it is said to do the work of a large number of men, and with the very best results. It ploughs out the drains, turning the ploughed matter on the centre of the road, where it is soon rounded off, so that any water falling finds its way at once into the cleared drains.—*Antigonish Outlook*.
