BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL MEETS

Appoints Committees for Year Passes Important Resolution

A meeting of the Council of the Wolf-ville Board of Trade was held Wednesday evening with President Graham, J. D. Harris, J. H. Baltzer, Dr. Grant, J.W. Williams and H. P. Davidsor present. At the request of the Halifax Board of Trade the following resolution was passed, copies of which will be sent to Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, the Ministers of Trade and Commerce and Finance, and to the representative for this county at Ottawa:

"Whereas, it is in the best interests of the Dominion as a whole that the imports and exports of Canada should pass through Canadian ports in the greatest volume possible, and
Whereas, the proposal to restrict the application of the British Preferential duties entirely to goods imported through Canadian Ports and for the general advantage of Canada, and
Whereas, the present session of the Dominion Parliament was opened with a speech from the Throne in which the following passage occurs: "It is the intention of the Government so to equipour important ports on the St. Lawrence route, and on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, so as to enable them to meet all requirements of modern navigation."

Canada's expenditure for the fiscal year ended March 31. 1926, will be \$342,036,597.16, according to the main estimates tabled in the House of Commons Monday evening by Hon. James A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance. While they show a decrease of \$6,933, 279.38 from the main estimates for the fiscal hear ending March 31st next, they do not include the railway estimates as this year's estimates do. The railway estimates for next year are \$67,668,000. Among the estimated expenditures for naryors and rivers in Nova Scotia annear the following: Avonoort. \$7.200: Marborville. \$2,500; Horton Landing. \$2,100; White Waters, \$2,700; Windsor, \$24,000.
