SITUATION AT OTTAWA

If the Papal Ablegate Controlled in Prerogative of Autonomy Bills.

Why Should it be Denied that His Influence Was Not Exercised in Manitoba Case.

MANITOBA MAY SETTLE WITH ONTARIO.

TORONTO, April 7.—The Mail and Empire's Ottawa correspondent says: "There has been considerable gossip in the lobbies about Sharette's statement to the Press. His excellency since Sunday has repeatedly refused to make a statement to the newspaper representatives, and it was therefore somewhat of a surprise when it was rumored in the precincts of the House after midnight on Wednesday night that an interview would shortly be forthcoming."

It is said that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after ten o'clock on Wednesday night left the House of Commons, called a cab and drove out to the Papal ablegate's residence. Whether this be true or not, it is a well known fact that some time after midnight, Alex. Johnston, member for South Cape Breton, a staunch adherent of Roman See, and one of the minister's whips, handed Mgr. Sharette's statement to the Press representatives. The query is, how did this document get into Mr. Johnston's possession?

CONNECTION ESTABLISHED.

Toronto Mail and Empire Inserts That the Papal Ablegate Spoke With Sir Wilfrid's Authority.

TORONTO, April 7.—The World says that the question, what warrant the Papal Ablegate had for so pointedly forecasting the decision of Dominion Government is not answered by denials of Sir Wilfrid Laurier that there was any understanding between Mgr. Sharette and himself to have the school question considered in connection with the extension of the boundaries of Manitoba. Sir Wilfrid Laurier must do a great deal more than he has done before he can be held to have cleared himself from the charge of laying the liberties of the Canadian provinces at the feet of the Church. The Mail and Empire says: The whole case points to the conclusion that through some change of communication the government and representative of His Holiness have acted together. They were certainly in co-operation on the Autonomy Bills. Those provisions were dictated by His Excellency.

lency, and they were not altered to meet the Sifton situation without His Excellency's consent. If the ablegate supervises the new Northwest constitutions in so far as they deal with this particular subject, why should it be denied that he is influential in the settlement of the Manitoba phase of the question. The case, let it be understood, is proven beyond dispute. The only question which remains to be settled is whether the intervention of a high ecclesiastic in public affairs in respect of which other dignitaries, natives and citizens of Canada, have no voice is to be permitted.

MANITOBA MAY WIN OUT.

By Arriving at an Understanding With Province of Ontario.

TORONTO, April 7.—The Globe's Winnipeg special says: "It is stated here that there is a possibility of Premier Roblin arranging a conference with Premier Whitney of Ontario for the purpose mutually agreeing on a division of the territory lying between the northern boundaries of two provinces, and then laying the arrangements before the Dominion Government to be legalized by legislative enactment."

TORONTO GLOBE VIEW.

Facts Distorted by Mr. Rogers of Manitoba, Says the Liberal Organ.

TORONTO, April 7.—The Globe makes no editorial reference to the statements issued in Winnipeg yesterday by Hon. Messrs. Rogers and Campbell, but devotes its leader to pointing out the alleged omissions and distortions in Mr. Rogers' first interview in the light of statements of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mgr. Sharette. "The whole of Mr. Rogers' statement," says the Globe, "was to establish a connection between Mgr. Sharette and Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The facts did not fit very well, but Mr. Rogers thought that by putting a little in here and leaving a little out there the job might be accomplished with some skillful straining and distortions."

WILL HELP LAWYERS.

Recorders and Others May Not Write Conveyances Unless Licensed.

At the last annual meeting of the Barristers' Society a resolution was adopted to urge upon the government the desirability of passing a Licensed Conveyancers' Act. The purpose of such legislation would be to prohibit any person not duly licensed from making conveyances of property, and in order to obtain such license the applicant would, of course, have to pass an examination. It is contended that at the present time much trouble is caused, and not infrequently expensive litigation ensues because of defective conveyances, defects because of the ignorance of legal forms and phraseology of the persons making out the conveyance. At the present time any person can make out a conveyance, and Justices of the Peace, Registrars of Deeds and school teachers are more often applied to do this work than are those whose special training peculiarly fits them to do the work in a proper manner. The lawyers do not object to the Registrars, J. P.s. and others doing the conveyancing as much as they object to the imperfect manner in which much of it is done. The committee appointed to wait upon the government and ask for this legislation is Mr. J. D. Plimney, Mr. J. H. Barry and Mr. A. R. Slipp. They have not yet interviewed the government.

POLICE COMMITTEE

Will Not Allow the Press to be Present at Their Meeting Today.

A meeting of the Administration of Justice Committee has been called for this afternoon after the special meeting of the Council. The meeting is called for the Mayor's office which means that press representatives and the public generally will not be allowed to attend, as all "public" meetings are now held in the Council Chamber. Chairman Randolph says the matter of Devine's escape from the Police Station will be finished up and he looks to see the night officers taking turn about at Police Station and patrol duty. There is a strong feeling that something should be done at once to hurry along the helmets for the police.

CANADIAN STOCK MARKET

Canadian Pacific Again the Feature on Montreal Exchange.

Active Buyers Looking For Stock at 155.

Prices All Along the Line Were Well Maintained.

MONTREAL, April 7.—The strong feature of the stock market this morning was C. P. R. which rose one point and sold up to 155. Dominion Coal was also strong, opening at 83 and going up to 84, afterward declining half a point. Lake of the Woods sold up to 113, the lowest sale being 111. The rest of the market was featureless and prices for the most part were steady. St. Paul was one weak feature, the market selling off three quarters of a point at 132.

THE PACIFIC NORTHERN.

Terms Under Which the Grand Trunk Pacific Get the Control.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 7.—In addition to the deal by which the Grand Trunk Pacific acquired proprietorship of 17,000 acres of coal lands in Telkwa Valley, Mr. F. W. Morse, while here recently, executed a contract by which the company becomes the possessor of the charter of the Pacific Northern and Omnica Railway. Mr. Morse, before leaving Victoria, deposited \$200,000 to bind the undertaking, and this sum has since been paid over to parties interested. The G. T. P. Co. agrees to expend \$100,000 in developing the Railway project before May 1st, 1907, and to complete the line within two years of that date.

Fireman's Serious Illness

The condition of Mr. Edward Burden, a popular member of the Hook & Ladder Company of the Fire Department, is reported as being so serious today that his recovery is doubtful. He has been laid up at his home on Westmorland street for some time with typhoid fever.
