FOLLOWS CANADA'S LEAD.

Australia to Adopt C. P. R.'s Ready-Made Farm Scheme.

London, Oct. 18.—"Traveller," writing in the Standard of Empire on the proposed adoption of the C. P. R. ready-made farm scheme in Australia, says: "Canada, the elder son of our house, has been privileged time and again to give the lead to the Greater Britain generally, and to the Mother Country, too, at times in matters touching on the development of the Empire. Her latest scheme, one of wholesome force, is about to be followed in the Antipodes. Australia, having decided to try out Canada's highly successful ready-made farm scheme, a scheme which owes its origin primarily to the master mind of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy."

"I have stated on more than one platform," the writer declares, "that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's scheme will prove the master key of twentieth century immigration. The proposed Sydney Company, I understand, will be a federal immigration company in its scope, with not less than one million pounds capital, and with grants of 200,000 acres of land in each of the states."

### U. N. B.'s Mistakes at Critical Times Gave Dalhousie Team the Opportunities to Win Best Football Game Seen Here in Years

Hulifax Team Wins by 11  
to 9 when U. N. B. had  
Game Well in Hand

U. N. B. Half Line Best

was Stronger.

A better knowledge of inside football, that in a few words tells how Dalhousie yesterday defeated U. N. B. in one of the most exciting football games seen here in many years.

The final score was 11 to 9, both teams made the same number of tries, three each, but Dal converted their second try and those two points were enough to win.

The showing of the U. N. B. team was the surprise of the day. They played a game that is hard to beat and a great majority of those who saw the game, thought U. N. B. should have won.

Many of the old U. N. B. graduates who were here to see the game were loud in their praise of the team and characterized the Red and Black as the best team U. N. B. has ever turned out. While this is a broad statement to make, it is to be noted that there have been very few better teams ever wearing the Red and Black.

Praise for "Hump" Campbell.

Coach "Hump" Campbell is the man to whom U. N. B. must hand the lion's share of the credit for the team's excellent showing, and when the game was over "Hump" was the recipient of numerous congratulations from the many friends he has made since he took up the task of developing a team that can "go the route" and it is to "Hump" Campbell's credit that they can.

Dalhousie presented a forward line averaging about 180 pounds, all experienced football players, and it was the forward line that won the game for them as their half line was in no way to be compared with U. N. B.'s, and when the latter got away they generally came within striking distance of the goal line or scored. Dalhousie were very strong in their quarter division, all three being good head players. Every Dal player "used his bean" and it was the gray matter that eventually gave them the game.

U. N. B.'s Fatal Mistakes.

As stated above the U. N. B. team were a big surprise. They played a better mechanical game than their opponents, but Dalhousie generally took advantage of the mistakes they made. Two plays stand out distinctly wherein U. N. B. players did the wrong thing and on each occasion Dalhousie scored. Bender held the ball behind him, and the referee allowed a Dalhousie player to tackle him when he had ample time to touch for safety, and have a twenty-five yard drop-out. He held the ball until the referee called time, and then he tackled and Referee Dolan called a five yard scrim, the ball being held in goal. The ball was held by the Dalhousie scrim on the line and the referee went over for the second try which made the score 6 to 6. Jones had a very easy kick, the try being made behind the posts and he converted placing his team in the lead. This mistake gave them five points lead. The other mistake proved a fatal one for U. N. B., and the offender was this time. On a kick from a Dalhousie back he loosed somewhat and then attempted to kick, only to have Richmond Crishton, who was following up full on the ball for the winning try. This was a bad play on the part of the full back when it looked as though the ball would fall on the ball as the end of the game was near, there being only three minutes left for play. Aside from these mistakes the U. N. B. team put up a grand game and will bear watching in the Intercollegiate games.

It would indeed be hard to pick a star on the U. N. B. team, but the game seen on College Field for many a day. Their passing was excellent, two of their tries being made on runs by their half backs, Murphy getting both. Dalhousie were outclassed in the half line and realized it as the game progressed, their forwards dribbling and keeping the ball out of open play all the second half. Johnny Dolan, a former U. N. B. player, was the referee, and did his job well, the game being a hard one to handle.

The First Half.

U. N. B. had the kick off and carried the play into the opponents' territory right off the reel. On a dribble of the U. N. B. forwards the ball went over the Dalhousie line and when Campbell fumbled McLean fell on the ball and U. N. B. had drawn first blood. McLean failed to convert. Score—U. N. B., 3; Dalhousie, 0. Dalhousie was then touched for safety and on the drop out Balkam made a nice run down the side but Campbell tackled him on the five yard line. Dalhousie were given a free kick as U. N. B. forwards were lying on the ball in the scrim. The Red and Black half line pulled off another long run but the five yard line was their limit. Dalhousie was then touched for safety and on the drop out Murphy and Bender did an Alphonse-Gaston stunt and Dal's forwards followed up for a big gain. U. N. B. worked the play down the field again and were hammering away at Dal's line when the visitors

"Chummy" Graham at quarter used his head all the time and that had a whole lot to do with the outcome of the game, as did "Farmer" Pineo, who is their pivot man in the scrim. I will go with the Dalhousie team to Sackville to referee the game with Mount A., and will tell The Gleaner what I think of the Mount A. team on Wednesday."

### Fredericton High School is Winner Over St. John, 5 to 3

The Fredericton High School football team sprung a surprise Saturday and won their game with St. John High School, 5 to 3. The Yellow and Black athletes showed a reversal of form from their other games played this season and their victory on Saturday was well earned.

The St. John team's showing was as good as was expected. The Fredericton High School team played a grand defensive game, their tackling being of a high order and their following up, especially in the first half, practically swept their opponents off their feet.

At only one time during the whole game were the visitors really dangerous, that being the first part of the second half when poor passing on the part of the Fredericton halves allowed St. John High to carry the play to the five-yard line. St. John accepted this, their only opportunity to score and sent over the line for their first try. There were many on the field who thought this try a questionable one, but Referee "Hump" Campbell allowed the try. Carter scored the only try of the local school on the best play of the game.

About the middle of the first half Fredericton High carried the play to the St. John twenty-five yard line on a succession of kicks. A scrim was called on the line and when the ball came out McLean passed to Young who then was about twenty yards and passed to Carter on the wing, the latter going over. Carter converted the try and the two points advantage from the kick proved enough to win.

The First Half.

Fredericton High had the kick off and immediately rushed the play into the Fredericton territory. Donovan secured the ball and was down on

the ten-yard line by Mooney. Donnelly relieved with a long kick, but the ball was returned by Belton and the play was kept on St. John's twenty-yard line for some time. St. John were given a free kick, but Jarvis blocked and followed up strong, Fredericton High gaining some on the play. Mooney broke away for a few runs and showed some fine dodging ability. Donnelly broke away for a thirty-yard run and had passed all except Selton when the latter made a swell tackle and brought him down. Young's long punt rolled about seventy yards and brought the play on St. John's five-yard line. Belton returned McAndrew's kick to touch-in-goal. Referee Campbell calling for a five-yard scrim. St. John gradually worked the ball to the twenty-five yard line by a succession of scrim-

pages. It was at this stage that Fredericton secured their try. The play remained in St. John's territory the remainder of the half. Score: Fredericton High School, 5; Saint John High School, 0.

Second Half.

St. John rushed things when play was resumed and helped along by the poor work of the Fredericton halves they soon had the ball on the Yellow and Black's five-yard line. On the second scrimmage here Mooney bucked through and Referee Campbell gave St. John the benefit of the doubt and called it a try. Donnelly failed to put his team on even footing, missing a very easy chance as the kick was from directly in front of the goal and the score read Fredericton High School, 5; St. John High School, 3. The game became more interesting at this stage and a few
