#### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST. Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of  
 Dominion Lands in Manitoba,  
 Saskatchewan and Alberta, except-  
 ing 8 and 26, not reserved, may be  
 homesteaded by any person who is  
 the sole head of a family, or any  
 male over 18 years of age, to the  
 extent of one-quarter section of  
 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be  
 made in person by the applicant at  
 a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-  
 agency for the district in which the  
 land is situated. Entry by proxy  
 may, however, be made at an Agen-  
 cy on certain conditions by the  
 father, mother, son, daughter,  
 brother or sister of an intending  
 homesteader.

The homesteader is required to  
 perform the homestead duties un-  
 der one of the following plans:

(1). At least six months' resi-  
 dence upon and cultivation of the  
 land in each year for three years.  
 (2). A homesteader may, if he  
 so desires, perform the required  
 residence duties by living on farm-  
 ing land owned solely by him, not  
 less than eighty (80) acres in ex-  
 tent, in the vicinity of his home-  
 stead. Joint ownership in land  
 will not meet this requirement.  
 (3). If the father (or mother,  
 if the father is deceased) of a  
 homesteader has permanent resi-  
 dence on farming land owned solely  
 by him, not less than eighty (80)  
 acres in extent, in the vicinity of  
 the homestead, or upon a home-  
 stead entered for by him in the  
 vicinity, such homesteader may per-  
 form his own residence duties by  
 living with the father (or) mother.

(4). The term "vicinity" in the  
 two preceding paragraphs is defin-  
 ed as meaning not more than nine  
 miles in a direct line, exclusive of  
 the width of road allowances cross-  
 ed in the measurement.  
 (5). A homesteader intending  
 to perform his residence duties in  
 accordance with the above while  
 living with parents or on farming  
 land owned by himself must notify  
 the Agent for the district of such  
 intention.

Six months' notice in writing  
 should be given to the Commis-  
 sioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa  
 of intention to apply for patent.

#### ROUSING MEETING AT BONAVENTURE

**J. H. Kelly, M. P. P., Relates His  
 Successful Efforts For  
 County's Welfare.**

#### GENERALLY ENDORSED

**Conservatives as Well as Liberals  
 Tender Mr. Kelly Their  
 Hearty Support.**

BONAVENTURE, Thursday.—Pro-  
 bably the largest meeting ever held  
 in Bonaventure took place on Sunday  
 last at the issue of Divine service  
 when Mr. John Hall Kelly, M. P. P.,  
 addressed over three thousand of his  
 electors.

Mr. Kelly has had many successful  
 political demonstrations since his en-  
 trance in politics a few years ago  
 but that extended to him last Sun-  
 day at Bonaventure when Liberals  
 and Conservatives alike cheered his  
 actions far surpassed anything in the  
 past.

In order to fully understand the cir-  
 cumstances it is necessary to refer to  
 the Robitaille limits which had been  
 held for so many long years with-  
 out being operated. Thanks to the  
 efforts of Mr. Kelly these limits after  
 some forty years bondage were hand-  
 ed over to the W. C. Edwards Com-  
 pany. It was also due to Mr. Kelly's  
 work that the LeBlanc property at  
 Bonaventure was also transferred to  
 the Senator Edwards Company.

In order to bring about the sale  
 of the Robitaille limits, Mr. Kelly,  
 some years ago, had caused a large  
 number of the lots to be sold out of  
 the Robitaille limits and the people  
 had held these lots without carrying  
 out the improvements required by law.

When these lots were sold there was  
 only one large mill in operation at  
 Bonaventure but since then a firm  
 by the name of LeBlanc & Daigle  
 and the Tracade Lumber Co. have  
 several mills in the parish of Bona-  
 venture and were operated on a fair-  
 ly large scale.

After the sale of the Robitaille lim-  
 its to the Senator Edwards Company  
 the latter applied to the Crown Land  
 Office at Quebec and asked for the  
 cancellation of all the lots upon which  
 the settlement conditions have not  
 been made. According to law the  
 company was in its right in asking  
 for the cancellation of these lots and  
 the law was in their favor. This,  
 however, effected a large number of  
 people who held these lots and when  
 the notices of cancellation were given  
 they appealed to Mr. Kelly in order to  
 prevent the cancellation from taking  
 place.

Two weeks ago Mr. Kelly went to  
 Bonaventure, Caplin and St. Alphonse  
 and held three large political meetings  
 and explained to the people that he  
 would leave immediately to interview  
 the Minister of Crown Lands at Que-  
 bec and if necessary would go to Ot-  
 tawa to see Senator Edwards in order  
 to fully explain the situation. There  
 were some twenty-five or thirty thou-  
 sand logs purchased by the Tracade  
 Lumber Company and which were  
 also claimed by the W. C. Edwards  
 Company and which the latter refused  
 to deliver up. Mr. Kelly took up the  
 question immediately on behalf of the  
 people and gave an account of his  
 work at the meeting held at Bona-  
 venture on Sunday last.

He explained that he had interview-  
 ed the Honorable Minister at Que-  
 bec and after his interview there had  
 gone on to Ottawa to see Senator  
 Edwards. At Ottawa he interviewed  
 the Senator along with Mr. Kelly and  
 Mr. R. N. LeBlanc, the local manager  
 for the company at Bonaventure, and  
 after an interview which lasted two  
 days he had returned to Montreal al-  
 ong with Senator Edwards, Mr. Le-  
 Blanc and there met Mr. McLean who  
 had come on from Buffalo.

The latter has large holdings also  
 in the Robitaille limits along with  
 Senator Edwards.

After a long interview at the Wind-  
 sor Hotel in Montreal with these  
 gentlemen Mr. Kelly succeeded in ob-  
 taining a letter signed by Senator  
 Edwards and Mr. McLean in which  
 they give the people whose lots were  
 up for cancellation a delay of three  
 years in order to cut the lumber off  
 their lots. This is a very exceptional lot  
 which could be lumbered on more than  
 two years and the fact of obtaining  
 three years gives the holders of these  
 lots more than ample time to move  
 any number of any value.

Mr. Kelly also secured from the  
 Tracade Lumber Company their  
 twenty-five thousand logs which the  
 Edwards Company claimed. In his  
 discourse Mr. Kelly explained that Mr.  
 Marcell had assisted at the interview  
 in Ottawa and had assisted him very  
 materially in obtaining the above re-  
 sult.
