AN UNWISE DECISION.

The action of the majority of the Bathurst ratepayers at the public meeting on the 30th ult., in turning down both the proposition to authorize the fire wardens to contract with a company to supply the town with water and the amendment providing for a plebiscite on the water question, seems to us very unwise. A place as large and important as Bathurst needs efficient protection from fire. Many a place has, before this, delayed to put in a water system until a fire swept the town out of existence and drove its industries to other sections. We trust that the sober second thought of the people of Bathurst will show them the necessity of immediate action to secure their homes and property from a possible sudden destruction.

The Spanish government has come to grief over the vexed question of Church and State. The late Cabinet, which was forced to resign a few days ago, because it was unable to meet the wishes of its Radical followers, proposed to enact religious laws somewhat similar to those passed in France several years ago. But the Liberal and Radical divisions of the government party disagreed, and the Conservative leader was called to power. The latter, however, was not able to command a majority of parliament, so the legislature has been dissolved, an early appeal to the electors being the only means of clearing up the situation. The Conservatives being now in power, the Clerical party feel confident of electing the majority of next parliament.

FORESTRY CONVENTION.

It is to be hoped that the Forestry Convention, which assembles in Fredericton, on the 20th inst., will be an unqualified success. As all who are interested are invited to be present, the attendance should be large. Among those who are expected to attend the Convention are, Mr. Benshaw, the head of the Forestry bureau at Washington, and Mr. Stewart, who holds a similar position at Ottawa.

Our forests are, at present, our most valuable asset, and too much cannot be taken of them. They, have, each year, been allowed to make great inroads upon them; and many private owners have cut everything off their lands, regardless of the future. With proper supervision our woods will yield timber for generations to come. Hungary with a population of twenty millions in a territory only four and a half times greater than that of New Brunswick, not only exports grain, but sends great quantities of lumber every year to foreign markets. Her forest area is small, but so thoroughly guarded that the annual cut has not decreased for centuries.

Women's Rights was a prominent subject at the seventh Annual conference of the British Labor Party held at Belfast, last month. A resolution in favor of the extension of the franchise to all adult men and women was carried by 605,000 to 268,000 votes represented. This was an amendment to the original motion, introduced by the Socialist delegates, to give women the right to be elected to parliament as well as to vote. Only the delegates representing 30 per cent. of the Union membership were in favor of giving women absolute political equality such as they enjoy in Finland, but none were opposed to women becoming voters. The conference also declared in favor of arbitration of national disputes and of a national educational policy which should include the maintenance of scholars by the State, scientific physical education, and the intellectual and technical education of teachers, education to be under full popular control, and the whole cost of the system to be met from the Imperial treasury.

THE GERMAN ELECTIONS.

The result of last month's general elections in Germany augurs ill for the world's peace. The Kaiser's government, which is not responsible to parliament, was defeated in December on the question of increased military appropriations for the South African colony. In dissolving parliament the Kaiser appealed for assistance to that element of the population who desires Germany to build a great navy, increase her armaments, and attempt to found a great colonial dominion beyond the seas, which program, by the way, can only be carried out by seizing Britain's possessions in South Africa and Australia, or by settling in South America in defiance of the United States and its Monroe doctrine. He especially appealed to the three million electors, who failed to vote at last election, to come out and defeat the Socialist party, as the latter have always opposed his military policy and his autocratic government. His appeal has succeeded, for, though they have greatly increased their total vote, the lost enough seats in parliament to make the government parties safe for another term.

Regarding the Socialist set back, the Toronto Globe editorially remarks:

"It seems clear that most, if not all, of the political parties in Germany have determined to co-operate for the virtual destruction of the Socialists as a party. So long as their leader, Herr Bebel, is left in the Reichstag, even if he were standing alone, his voice would be a potent force for the ultimate political redemption of Germany from autocracy, bureaucracy, and militarism. He is not only an enlightened humanitarian, but a practical statesman, and at some future time, when the burdens of a useless and needless military system bring about inevitable reaction, he or one of his disciples will again lead a strong political party."

Now that the Kaiser is supreme at home for the next five years, it will be interesting to note how he will proceed to carry out his plans. The U. S. A. can build warships as fast as he can; Japan is building a few, and Britain is far from being out of the race. To found a colonial empire, he will have his hands full.

On the first day's voting the total vote of the three strongest parties in the Empire was as follows: Socialist, 3,251,806; Centre, 2,274,097; Conservative, 1,124,923. The total vote of the whole fifteen parties was about 11,000,000, of which the Socialists got about 30 per cent.

The Lower House of the Austrian parliament, last month, unanimously adopted a resolution calling upon the government to prepare an Old-Age Pensions Bill for submission to the Imperial Parliament of Austria-Hungary. Although it is not probable that anything definite will result from the resolution at present, it is interesting as showing that the question of old-age pensions is engaging public attention in Austria as well as in this country.

Recently, a firm of London, England, drapers had within two hours, 351 personal applications for a two-weeks position as porter. Many of the applicants were dressed like city clerks. When such a state of affairs exists in any civilized country, let alone the largest city in the world, its boasted prosperity must be considered a select few who have seized everything of worth taking, leaving to the masses the crumbs and scraps. The basis of such a civilization is not permanent; and, unless a change or the better comes speedily, its destruction is certain.

TOWN HALL

At the public meeting held in Dinwiddie's Hall last week the advisability of building a town hall was considered pro and con. Campbellton needs a town hall—a building in which town offices, fire department, etc., will be located. But there are other things the town needs and needs badly, which, if the necessary money is in sight, should be had as soon as possible. Our citizens know what we refer to and it is not necessary for us to say anything further in the matter. We understand that a vote of the people will be taken in order to ascertain whether or not the ratepayers are willing that thirty or forty thousand dollars shall be spent on the proposed town hall. If our people consider that the town cannot get along without the contemplated building it will be up to them to say so. If on the other hand, the ratepayers consider that the other mentioned inadequacy should be first remedied they should veto the town building movement.

ACCIDENT ON I. C. R.

A farmer named Steeves was this morning run down and badly injured by Conductor Capson's Moncton-bound freight special, the accident occurred at Mountain Road crossing about eight miles from this city, on the St. John division. The extent of the man's injuries are not known, but it is thought by the train crew that he was quite badly hurt.

The accident occurred about half past ten. Steeves had been hauling logs from the woods, and employed a team of horses. The lead was an exceptionally heavy one, and became stranded on the track, the horses being unable to pull it further. Hearing the approach of the train, the man ran up the track, waving his hat, but Driver Joseph Stockford, of this city, who was at the throttle could not bring the locomotive to a standstill, and it crashed into the lead of logs, scattering them in all directions, while the horses escaped injury.

Steeves in the meantime, when he found it impossible to have the train stopped, started back in the direction of his team running alongside the cars. It is thought that he ventured too close to the train, and some projecting part caught him, throwing him into the ditch.

The train which was running at the regulation speed of about twenty miles an hour at the time, was brought to a standstill, and some men who were nearby took charge of the injured man conveying him to his home.

The crossing on which the team was struck is not a regular road, but what is known as a "farm crossing." It is about a mile west of Jones' Station. Transcript, 4th
