Tinned Lobster

There is a good demand for Canadian tinned lobster if properly put up. Only heavily tinned plates should be used for making cans (Lobster packed quickly on light plates) the inside of which should be lined with heavy parchment paper and the lobster packed while thoroughly fresh. This requires large packing factories. Small factories do not as a general rule employ skilled labor and as they cannot pack as fast as supplies come in during the packing season the result is that stale or partially stale goods are packed which do not favor very quickly. MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

A Valuable Legislative Committee Report on Theories and Practice.

A volume remarkable for the amount of valuable information it contains is the report on municipal trading and municipal ownership, or operation of public utilities, just issued in accordance with an order of the Legislature, passed in June last.

The report is mostly given to "an epitome of the periodical and other literature produced within the last few years on the subject of the municipal or other ownership of public or quasi-public utilities." The extracts chiefly relate to water, gas, electric light and power plants, and street transportation.

The volume has been prepared by Mr. Avera Pardoe, Librarian of the Legislature, at the direction of the special committee of the House, and is a monument to months of painstaking labor and research. He remains from passing judgment on the question of municipal ownership, but states that he has endeavored to utilize an equal quantity of material on each side. He adds that "it is likely enough the advocates of either side will be surprised to learn the weight of the statistics and the depth of the feeling on the other side."

The information is gathered from theories and from practical results in Great Britain, the United States and Canada. A table of statistics respecting Ontario municipal undertakings, is a reliable record of the actual work in this Province. This are appended several pages of interesting notes.

BIBLE IN BIGAMY CASE.

May Not Prove a Guide in Marriage—Criminal Case May Differ.

Precedents are familiar in courts, but there was doubt introduced in the Toronto Police Court at a recent session which was quite novel.

Reference to chap. 30 and 31, section 104 or 105, sub section 104 of the R.S.O. are familiar, but this morning the court was startled by citations from Holy Writ.

John Prentiss and Mary E. Worsley were charged with bigamy, because they were wedded on Sept. 5th, 1903, while the latter had a husband living. Both are far beyond the giddy age of youth, being about fifty years of age.

"I don't think I did anything wrong," said John, and the woman looked in a manner which seemed to say "me too."

Forthwith the lady produced a formidable looking paper which she handed to the Crown Attorney. He smiled.

"This is an order of separation," he said. "But it doesn't give the right to marry again."

"According to Deuteronomy it does," replied the man, producing his little Bible.

"I am afraid that is not in the criminal code," ventured the Magistrate, "and you know it is the criminal code we go by here."

It was agreed the case should stand to a later date, but before leaving court the alleged bigamists submitted their defence as contained in a Bible marked at Deut. 24, verses 1 and 2.

"For the benefit of those who have not their Bibles handy, they are reproduced."

"When a man hath taken a wife and married her and it come to pass that she find no favor in his eyes because he has found some uncleanness in her, then let him write her a bill of divorce and give it in her hand and send her out of his house."

"And when she is departed out of his house she may go and be another man's wife."

The complainant in the case is Thos. Worsley, of Fenelon Falls, and it comes to a Toronto court by a circuitous course. Three years ago Worsley found his wife with an order of separation, as well as her local third of the property and family. A third of the family represented two. Shortly after she married the said John Prentiss, but he died. On September 5, 1903, she again married John Prentiss, of Toronto. He came under the statute, because he is alleged to have known that the woman he married had another husband at the time. It is alleged the children have not been properly cared for in the city, and in this way the case came to the notice of the authorities.—Telegraph.

Reptiles Born in Canada.

At first glance the idea of Russia exporting a large quantity of furs into Canada each year would appear almost incredible, in view of the fact that the Dominion is to-day, and has been ever since the days of La Salle, one of the world's chief sources of supply.

At the present time there is in Montreal a tall, distinguished looking Russian, a member of one of the big Moscow fur trading firms. When seen at the office of the Imperial Fur Bureau, M. P. Swachnikoff, for such is the Moscow gentleman's name, stated that the trade with Canada was a very valuable one in such furs as Persian lamb, grey lamb, astrachan and taluppen, which is the Russian name for a cheaper lamb skin which goes into the making of moderate-priced overcoats.

First in importance in the importation of Persian lamb skins which amounts to some five hundred bales per year, is each bale contains two hundred skins, the sum total comes to no small figure. The importation is worth between three and four hundred thousand dollars per year. The astrachans which come out of Russia, each year to Canada have a value ranging between \$100,000 and \$200,000. Taluppen is imported into the country to the extent of \$50,000, and another fur called Crimex, will amount to another \$50,000.

Mr. Swachnikoff stated that the Persian lamb skins imported into Canada come from the Buzara district of Central Asia, which was a Russian possession. The astrachans come from Russia's northern territories. A sum total of the value of furs sent from Russia to Canada each twelve months will run in the neighborhood of three-quarters of a million dollars, and this does not take into consideration that most costly of all furs, the Russian sable. Of these, however, there are no great quantities imported.

M. de Struve, Russian Consul, who was present, gave some figures relative to the large business which his country is doing in the raw sugar trade. Of best sugars the Russian Empire ranks third in the world's production, the figures for 1902-03 being 1,185,000 tons.

Canada's Librarian.

Mr. Martin J. Griffin, the Parliamentary Librarian at Ottawa, has returned, with Miss Griffin, from a two-months' trip to England and the Continent. Mr. Griffin was the guest of Senator Power in Halifax, on his way back. During his presence in London, The Canadian Gazette said of him: "Mr. Griffin, after completing his university course, studied law, and was for some time managing editor of The Toronto Mail. He was secretary to the civil commission appointed to inquire into the working of the Canadian civil service. Upon the death of the late Mr. Alfred Todd, Griffin was appointed to his position, and is a very voluminous contributor to leading reviews and magazines. His surviving son is a partner in law with Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, at Vancouver."
