

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Mr. Harris, R. C. A., arrived in Charlottetown on Wednesday, after an absence of two years.

The house of Mr. Patrick Coyle, Kent Street, was consumed by fire on Wednesday last. Loss \$200.00, covered by insurance.

The coroner's jury summoned to hold an inquest on the body of the late Daniel Butler, concluded "deceased came to his death from natural causes."

At 3.30 this afternoon the alarm was sounded for a fire at Taylor's paint shop, near King Square. It was extinguished before the engines got to the scene.
