Old No. 2 are quoted at \$5.50 to \$6.00 per barrel for ordinary grades, and \$6.50 for extra. Fresh mackerel continues scarce, and lots from Nova Scotia command full prices. Butter quotations range from 15 to 19 cents, according to quality.

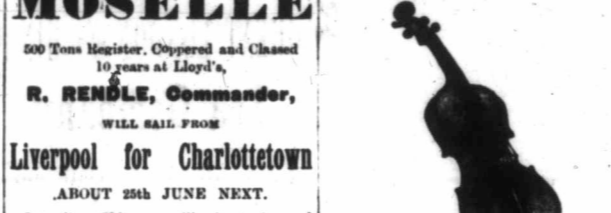
