THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

We believe Reeve Proudfoot and Deputy-Reeve Smith did a proper thing at the last meeting of the council when they brought forward a motion asking that a joint railway committee, composed of councillors and prominent private citizens, be formed to work together for the promotion of the railway interests of the town.

With all due deference to the gentlemen who voted down Reeve Proudfoot's motion, we will venture the statement that, if tomorrow a communication was received from Mr. VanHorne, stating that he wanted a delegation of a dozen Goderich men to go into the section of country between this point and Guelph to further the scheme and promote the interests of the road, not one of the gentlemen who voted in the negative would have a place on the contingent.

It is all well enough for seven men out of twelve to claim that they, and they only, have a right to look after the railway interests of the town, but it is not right that the town should suffer because so absurd a view is taken by the seven men.
