MAYOR EXPLAINS THE POWER BY-LAW

Says Object is Merely to Retain Rights in the Site.

(From Monday's Daily.) "There seems to be a misunderstanding as to the object of the council in asking the people to vote \$100,000 for the development of power at Grand Rapids," said Mayor Armstrong Saturday morning referring to the adverse criticism which has developed during the last few days.

"I should be clearly understood that we are obliged to take this course in order to hold our rights in the site," said the mayor. "The government agrees to give us these rights only on the condition that this by-law is passed."

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ORANGEMEN PROTEST AGAINST "NO TEMERE"

Edmonton Lodge Passes Resolution and Places Itself on Record as Opposed to the "No Temere" Decree.

(From Tuesday's Daily.) At the last meeting of Edmonton Orange Lodge No. 1734, the following resolution was enthusiastically passed:

"Resolved, that we, the officers and members of Loyol Orange Lodge No. 1734, Edmonton, Alberta, desire to place ourselves on record as vigorously protesting against the 'No Temere' decree, as confirmed by the Pope, and carried into effect by the Roman Catholic Church in the province of Quebec."

"We view with alarm any church tampering with the legal marriage contract, and we can foresee grave danger to the future life of our western country among our mixed nationalities, if any church decree could annul our civil marriage law."

"Therefore, to preserve our national home life, to foster the assimilation of the incoming races, to develop strong Christian Canadians from this great international influx of peoples, we urge our civil marriage law throughout our entire Dominion. We claim equal rights for all, and special privileges to none."

"Masks False Declaration. Baldur, Man, June 9.—Arthur Brocken of the Winton district, who has nested in the constituency since March 14th, was yesterday fined fifty dollars and costs by Magistrate Clark for making a false declaration in order to get his voters list."

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John Chalmers Opposes the Power Proposition

Public Works Department Engineer Asks for Information as to Scheme Before Ratepayers Shall be Called Upon to Vote \$100,000.

(From Monday's Daily.) John Chalmers, engineer connected with the provincial department of public works, has written the following letter to the Bulletin dealing with the Grand Rapids hydro-electric power proposition, in connection with which \$100,000 as an initial outlay, is to be submitted to the ratepayers on June 17.

"In connection with the vote to be taken on the 17th inst., for the purpose of authorizing an expenditure of \$100,000 in connection with the development of hydro-electric power at Grand Rapids on the Athabasca river, the writer was in hopes that a clear explanation of the project would have been given to the citizens of Edmonton before they were called upon to vote any money on the proposed works, but so far no information has been forthcoming to afford an intelligent conception of what the council proposes to do."

"The 2,000 k. w. machine was again the cause of the trouble.
