#### Deadlock in the Legislature.

No Surrender on Either Side by Mem bers of Saskatchewan House.

Regina, Sask., March 13.-A curious situation exists in the Saskatchewan Legislature. At midnight on Saturday a 61 hour deadlock ended to be re newed to-day. Each side is firmly resolved not to surrender. No business can be transacted, and it looks as if dissolution is inevitable. The trouble developed an acute stage on Thursday when the Opposition anonunced that no business will be transacted until the Government had given assurance that the new voters list would be prepared. This Premier Scott refused to do. The Opposition claims there are no proper voters list in existence in the Province.
