### The Passing of Mr. Justice Emerson The Chief Justice.

Mr. Justice Emerson passed to his eternal rest this morning. For many vears he was a severe sufferer from an internal disease, and this he bore with marked fortitude. A few days ago his illness took a severer form and on Sunday assumed a critical stage and this morning. The deceased was born at Harbor Grace on September 24th, 1853, and was educated at the famous grammar school there, conducted by the late John Roddick. In 1871 he commenced the study of law in the commenced the study of law in the office of his uncle, the late Prescott Emerson, Q.C., and followed it in the office of three harristers who after offices of three barristers who after-wards were raised to the Bench, Chief isfied himself with knowing the rule Justice Carter, Mr. Justice Winter and Mr. Justice Pinsent. He was gifted with exceptional powers of mind, well developed by training, and he had also the power of apt, ready and incisive speech. Mr Justice Emerson was distinctly a strong personality on the Bench, and his death will be a great loss to the judiciary. But it was not only as a lawyer and judge that Mr. Emerson gained eminence. From his student days he took a live interest in public affairs. He first contacted the Cornel and was defeated by Sir Ambrose Shea. Later he contested Harbor Main unsuccessfully. With the death of Judge Emerson, the Supreme Court has sustained a great loss in as much as the late Judge was probably one of the most gifted of any of the Judges who have sat on the Supreme Court Bench during the past decade. Thirty-five years ago George Henry Emerson was a prominent member of the Bar and twenty-six years ago he was appointed Speaker of the House of Assembly.
