The "Morning Post." announces

that on March 5 its price will be raised to twopence (4 cents) and with characteristic candour it declares ply is cut down, and papers must meet the difficulty either by cutting down their size or increasing their price so that their circulation decreases. The plan of increasing the price, begun by some newspapers in the North, was ollowed by the "Times," the "Daily Sketch," the "Daily Mirror," and now the "Morning Post" and the "Observer" and "Daily Mail" are taking the same line. The "Daily Telegraph," "Daily Chronicle" and "Daily News" are remaining at their old price with a reduced newspaper. It is admitted by the Government that newspapers are fulfilling a public function in the conduct of the war as nearly half the material that they publish is really official bulletins and announcements and news, casualty lists, and official advertisements. Everyone knows that a very large number of periodicals are issued, such as boys' comic papers, and girls' novelettes and a host of other equally non-essential publications. Until the supply of paper for these productions is put on a different level from that of newspapers fulfilling a definite public service it is hard to believe that there can really be a shortage of paper, although the newspapers have good reason to know that it is so. It may be difficult to draw the line between publications which are fulfilling an essential public service and those which are not, but there are a very large number which are an unmistakable distance rom that debatable line.
