League of Nations.

At each sitting of the Peace Conference, whether regular or informal, the question of the League of Nations crops up at nearly every turn of the discussions. Like Banquo's ghost "it will not down," and it will be in order for the Conference to appoint a Special Committee with the object of preparing some definite scheme for the proposed formation of the League. If this has not been already done, there is grave danger of League discussions breaking the carrying out of the other work of the Congress.

The difficulty of formulating any specific plan for the organization of a National League, at the present time, is great. Almost one half of Europe is in a state of turmoil, akin to anarchy and lawlessness, and civil war is more or less raging far and wide. Under such conditions then it appears to be an idle waste of time to even discuss any arrangements of a League nature at the Conference. A working Committee, without delaying the other proceedings, might possibly form a plan of organization, to be presented after the work for which the Conference was primarily called is concluded. By that time the unsettled conditions in Eastern Europe, as well as in Germany, may have toned down and shaped themselves for the adjustment and reconstruction which must inevitably ensue. In any case the powers of Europe are not going to allow themselves to be forever sitting on a powder mine of revolution, and if the countries in which internecine strife is at present raging do not cease from bloodshed and disorder, they will have to be dealt with drastically and effectively.

Another question, charged with grave moment in solution, is what countries in Europe can be placed in the League category. Some days ago it was stated that Germany, Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey, could not, for some time to come, be incorporated into the League, neither of these countries being in a position, at present to join and uphold such. Neither is Russia. Clearly then, there but remain, Britain, France and Italy of the European accord, with the other small nations, Spain, Switzerland, Holland and the Scandinavian countries, and the Balkan countries which are not embroiled in civil war. Portugal at the moment is in the throes of revolution, and cannot be considered as a possible member. The European system having primarily to be considered as the nucleus of a successful league of nations, it is obvious that until absolute order is restored in every section of the continent, the scheme cannot be advanced. How to deal with the European problem, the Conference will have to determine finally, before either the United States or Japan and the other overseas allies of the Entente will consent to come in as members, and it is safe to say that no human assembly ever had a more perplexing problem presented to it.

Reading all that is written of the advantages, which the formation of this League of Nations will give to the world, and then taking the complex questions which are daily confronting the Peace Conference with regard to it, and the apparent impossibility of satisfying the demands of the peoples of Europe recently emancipated from the chains of autocracy, and to whom freedom as we know it, will long remain as a sealed book—the average Anglo-Saxon is more than likely to accept the dictum of Lord Robert Cecil who believes "that the world has not reached the stage at which an absolutely rigid system for the preservation of International Peace can be set up." In other words the time is not yet ripe for a League of Nations.

City's Health.

During the week 8 cases of diphtheria, 10 of smallpox and 49 of Spanish influenza were reported in the city. At present in hospital are 28 diphtheria, 5 smallpox and 37 influenza patients, while 12 with diphtheria, 1 with scarlet fever and 23 with influenza are being treated at home. Three residences were disinfected and released from quarantine.

Scotia's Poet.

1759-1796.
Robert Burns, the national poet of Scotland, and "the sweetest bard that ever breathed the soothing strain," was born of very poor parents, in Ayrshire. His father was a farmer, and after many years of wanderings and sojournings, he settled in Ayr, where the poet was born on Jan. 25, 1759. The necessity of helping support the family of several children, of whom the bard was the eldest, gave him little opportunity for schooling, so that the class-room gave our poet but little assistance in climbing the Parnassian heights. He was a poet of Nature's own making, which accounts for his popularity. For Nature, after all, is the grand agent in making poets. He early began the rhyming trade, and continued it through the vicissitudes of his thirty-seven years of life. At the basis of all his power lay absolute truthfulness, intense reality—truthfulness to the objects which he saw, truthfulness to himself as the seer of them. His poetry expresses how keenly he observed the sterling worth of the man he met, no less than their pretence and hollowness, the humour, the drollery, the pathos and the sorrow of human existence; and he expressed them in his own words, in the language of his fireside, with a directness and vitality that tingled to the finger-tips, and made his work forever classical. His songs are already part of the mother tongue. Wherever the English language is heard, beneath the suns of India, amid African deserts, on the Western Prairies of America, among the squatters of Australia, the songs of Burns give to men a perfect utterance of their deepest feelings, and most genial feelings. He died, of a lingering illness, on 21st July, 1796. "Flow gently, Sweet Afton," "Highland Mary," and a score of other old favorites, bid to the popularity of the ploughman poet. Slowly there grew a tender awe, Sun-like o'er faces brown and hard, As if in him who read they felt and saw Some presence of the bard.

He who doth this, in name or prose, May be forgotten in his day, But surely shall be crowned at last with those Who live and speak for aye. —Lowell.

M. C. L. I.

A fairly large number of the members of the M. C. L. I. was present last night to debate the resolution,—"That, in the interests of the returned soldiers, a Y. M. C. A. be established in St. John's and should be organized this year." The leaders of the affirmative were Messrs. R. Hearder, S. Woods and W. White, and for the negative, Messrs. Geo. P. A. Grimes and (President) Thos. Soper.

Mr. Hearder took the history of the formation of the Y. M. C. A. in 1844—"75 years ago"—by Mr. (now Sir) George Williams. It was organized to supply means whereby young men could receive culture and innocent amusement. The organization has been established in 10,000 cities all over the world, and has a membership of more than 1,000,000. Young men have many leisure hours, and the problem is how they are to spend that time to the best advantage to themselves. Every young man who has travelled abroad, and seen the Y. M. C. A.'s in other countries. The buildings each contain a gymnasium with an expert instructor, who can teach a variety of games, including, etc., can be learned; a swimming pool and shower baths; a games room where billiards, bowling, etc., can be enjoyed; a library; a comfortable reading room and library; a correspondence room, supplying a strong incentive to write letters to friends; a lecture hall where entertainments could be held. The soldiers, when on the other side, had the glad hand extended to them, and it is our duty to do the same for them here.

Mr. G. P. A. Grimes, for the negative, was just as anxious to form a Y. M. C. A. here as being, was active, but he could not see how it could be done by the end of 1919—eleven months. Before such an organization could be formed, the support of the different religious denominations must be secured, and the interest of the young men assured. Thirty or forty years ago, such an organization was being formed here, and it failed through because of the lack of support. Then there is the financial side. A building suitable for a Y. M. C. A. here, does not exist in St. John's, and it would be necessary to erect one, which would cost at least \$50,000, and it would be impossible to get the amount by the end of 1919. A pulpit campaign agitating for a Y. M. C. A. is necessary. Wealthy men are not going to contribute toward the project until they have seen the organization on the part of young men to make it successful, is assured.

Mr. Sydney Woods was in favour of forming such an organization, and read a circular prepared in connection with the formation of a Y. M. C. A. here in 1904, showing that the religious leaders were unanimous in their support.

President T. Soper, for the negative, thought it necessary to have the support of the religious denominations before anything could be done.

Mr. Wm. White considered that the environment of the young man a very important thing, and proper environment—where the Y. M. C. A. should be supplied here, a \$50,000 building is not necessary immediately, that would come. But the fact that she has organized, and a beginning made.

Lieut. Woods, an old friend of the Institute, told in an interesting manner of the work of the Y. M. C. A. in other cities, and was of the opinion that the organization of a local branch is very desirable.

Mr. E. Edgcombe thought it impossible to have a Y. M. C. A. until a building is supplied.

Mr. Jos. Moore thought it, very desirable, but impracticable.

Mr. Wm. Dwyer thought that a beginning should be made.

Mr. Bowden considered that until the support of the young men was forthcoming, it was impossible.

Mr. S. Penney thought that the spirit of comradeship amongst the returned soldiers called for a Y. M. C. A. On being put, the motion passed by a very substantial majority, and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

The Evangelists.

So much has been said about the crowds that nightly fill the apse of Gower Street Church, that very little remains unrelayed, yet because of those who are not privileged to be present, we must repeat the oft made statement that another capacity audience was on hand when Mrs. Demarest, accompanied by Mr. Demarest, came to the Rostrom last night. Long before that every seat was occupied by thronging crowds who waited on the street from before 7 o'clock for the doors to open. After the usual Song Service prayer was offered, then Mr. Demarest rendered a very effective solo in full rich tenor voice, the words of which were written by the "Marchale" to music arranged from the Old Scotch Air "Will ye no, come back again" by Mrs. Demarest.

The scripture lesson from the epistle to the Philippians, Chapter 2, verses 13 and 14, was read, and the address was based upon Verse 13 and 14: "Paul was deeply in love with the Church at Philippi and used most endearing and appreciative terms to describe his sentiments toward them, calling them his children, his beloved, his joy and crown. Many of his disciples through unbeliefness had caused him sorrow and called forth many words of reproach, but these being steadfast true and faithful were very dear to him. Then his appreciation was increased because this faithfulness and diligence was sustained during his absence from them. Left to themselves they were constant in love and loyal to the trust reposed in them."

The speaker drew many lessons from the encouragement of the disciples to-day, quoting the precious promise of Christ to Thomas, "Blessed are those who believe—who have not seen me," illustrating the point with touching stories from real life.

The test of true discipleship was diligence and faithfulness during the absence of our Lord.

The great skill of the speaker in dealing with certain passages which occasioned differences of interpretation, was shown in the latter part of the text, in which the apostles advise the Philippians to "work out your own salvation." It is a gift and must be accepted and possessed first, and worked out afterward. To be of any avail, the gifts must be effective in every avenue, and in all the activities and relationships of life.

The thrilling experience of what this meant to one who found the pardon and restitution, was told with splendid effect.

It is quite impossible to convey any adequate impression of the persuasive, attractiveness, illuminating exegesis, convincing argument, withal the holiness of hypocrisy, which is nightly poured forth on the assembled multitude, at the feet of the gifted Evangelist.

Many have tried to discover the secret of this unique personality, but have failed. The speaker is a man of God, and is with her and that she has found the Talmud of all the ages in the happy possession of a Spirit filled life.

At the close of the address an urgent plea was made for present decision that was accepted by many.

The music closed with Prayer and Benediction by Rev. D. B. Hemmison. Meetings for Prayer will be held in the School Room of Gower Street Church from 8 to 9 o'clock this afternoon.
