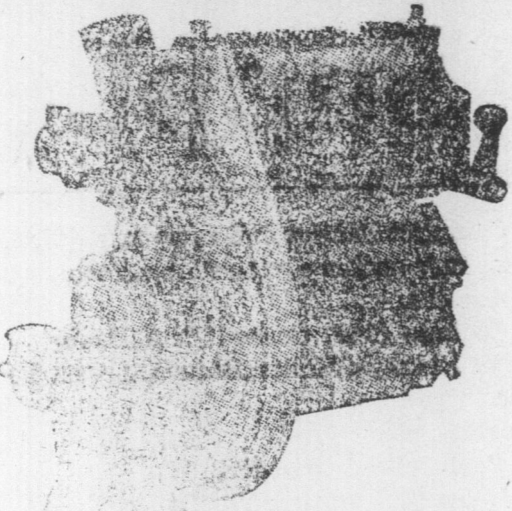

Newfoundland Fisheries.

(H. W. LeMessurier—Imperial Trade Correspondent.)

The Cod Fishery, which is the principal resource of Newfoundland, was highly remunerative during the year 1918. Although the catch was not equal in quantity to that of previous years, the enhanced value in the foreign markets enabled buyers to pay high prices, and the value of the product was much greater than that of the previous year. The shore fishery was exceptionally good in some districts, such as that of Ferryland, whilst it was poor from north of Cape Freels to Cape Band. The Bank Fishery showed a decrease of thirty per cent, due, in part, to the presence of German submarines on the Grand Banks. The Labrador Fishery also showed a decrease in the catch, but the increase in price more than compensated for the loss in quantity. The Seal Fishery showed a decrease in quantity of 44,978 seals, but an increase in weight of 691 tons, and in value of \$346,836. The Herring Fishery was vigorously prosecuted, the catch being the largest and most profitable in the annals of the industry. The markets of the United Kingdom take all our catch if it is well and packed. The Government are striving to ensure a steady and regular supply of fish, and are endeavoring to keep control of the fishery markets. On the 1st of July the Department of Fisheries issued a new order during the past season. A new departure was made in the manner of marketing the fish. The Newfoundland Fishery Company, which was formed in 1917, is now in operation, and is handling the fish direct to the consumer. The company is a limited liability company, and is controlled by the Government. Father and Son.

Girls seem to be better than boys—that is, better in those qualities which we grown-ups admire in children.

The reason may be in the fact that mothers are more in the nature of companions to their daughters, while the father is more of the relation of boss or commander over the sons rather than one of full confidence and companionship.

Fathers usually give the command to do or not to do.

A daughter becomes a companion of the mother both in household and social duties, and she learns to do or not to do more by ways of suggestion and experience.

A father in his business life is either a boss or is bossed, and he takes the spirit of command home with him—to his boys at least.

In a boy being commanded not to do, there is very often suggestion to do; for we can all remember that when we were told not to play with the beans—that we might get them in our noses, and all of which started a grand rush for the bean bag as soon as our parents were out of sight.

Or if a boy is told by his father not to play with firearms—that he will either shoot himself or his companions.

The boy's curiosity is awakened, he gets possession of an old cast iron revolver, shoots it off a few times, and if nothing happens, and usually it does not—why, he loses confidence in his father's judgment.

If the father would take the boy out with him in the nature of a companion, shoot the gun with him, the boy's curiosity would be satisfied in safety and it could at the same time be explained to him that all precautions in handling firearms are taken against the law of exception—that no chance can be taken in the matter of loss of life—that which cannot be replaced.

A good many fathers are making a very intelligent study in the art of salesmanship in their businesses.

The same study in its results would apply at home in the guidance of their sons.

Goods are no longer sold by commanding the purchaser, nor by a stronger will predominating over a weaker one.

Goods are sold on "reason why" by the salesman appealing to the pleasure of profits to the prospective purchaser—appealing to his self-interest.

Why cannot the same appeal be made by the father to his son?

Why not apply the suggestion "do" with the "reason why," as in the case of good salesmanship, rather than the command "don't."

And reason has more force in companionship than by commandment.

Education and Empire.

No more striking instance, as every sound patriot must hope it will prove, of great good coming out of great evil has ever been known than the educational effort which has sprung out of the War. The speeches delivered at the conference called by the Chief of the Imperial General Staff, afford hope that, for the British Empire at least, Armageddon has not thrown us back a hundred years, but carried us forward at a bound by a whole generation. Men from Great Britain and the Dominions have been given opportunities for education, in subjects and in places, which, but for the War, might have been for ever beyond their reach. English, Australian, Canadian, South African mingle in the class-room as they mingled on the battlefield, and thousands will in the years to come look back on their soldiering days as those which opened to them the portals of knowledge. Mr. Fisher detects in the movement the germ of any All-Empire educational organization, and Colonel Amery, speaking to a text provided by Lord Milner, foresees in the interchange of students from all parts of the Empire a new outlook and a new angle of vision. Education alone can fit democracy for the responsibilities of government, and nowhere is education more essential than in regard to the British Empire. "There never was such a story as that of the British Empire," said General Sir Henry Wilson.—United Empire.

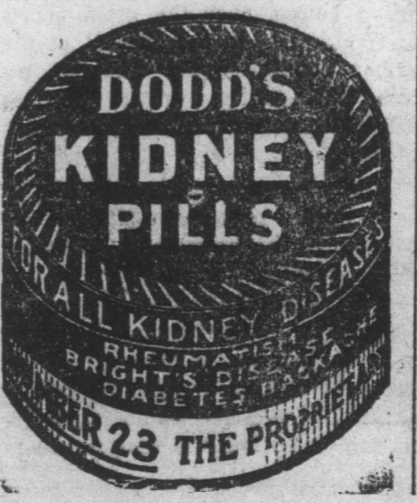
