

To-day's Messages.

COWES, Isle of Wight, Aug. 9.
What is believed to be a record passage across the Atlantic for a thirty six foot yawl was made by the Typhoon, which arrived this morning after making a non-stop run. It is claimed, from Cape Race, Newfoundland, to Bishop's Rock, Sicily Islands, a distance of two thousand one hundred miles, in fifteen days and nine hours. The passengers on the boat were Frederick Baldwin of Toronto, James Dorset of Washington, and William Duttin of New York. They said they encountered heavy seas and came through well, claiming a record passage in their effort to reach Cowes in time for the International Motor Boat Races, which begin here to-morrow.

HOSTILE PRESS COMMENT.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
Newspapers of many shades of opinion find themselves in agreement in condemning the Governments' handling of Archbishop Mannix. The Northcliffe papers, with the Daily Express and Daily News declare that the Governments' persecution has endowed him with martyrdom, the Times adding that the Governments' attitude seems dictated by fear, even though this prelate is generally discredited.

CRIMES BILL PASSES.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
The House of Lords read the Irish Crimes Bill to-day for the second time, without division, and the Royal Assent was afterwards given.

BRITISH BOLSHEVISTS PROTEST.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
Premier Lloyd George presided over an all cabinet council on his return to the city to-night from his Hythe conference with Premier Millerand. He told his colleagues the result of the conference, and discussed its bearings in connection with the statement, which is to be made to Parliament by him to-morrow. The Independent Liberals held a meeting in the House of Commons to-night, and passed a resolution protesting against any intervention against Russia by way of blockade, men, money or munitions.

LABOR'S DENUNCIATION.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
War between the Allied Powers and Soviet Russia over Poland, would be "an intolerable crime against humanity," and British labor has warned the British Government that organized labor will be used to defeat such a war. This decision was reached to-day at a meeting of the most prominent of the leaders of British labor, who later issued the following statement: "This Conference feels certain that a war is being engineered between the Allied Powers and Soviet Russia on the issue of Poland and it declares that such a war would be an intolerable crime against humanity. It therefore warns the Government that the whole industrial power of organized workers will be used to defeat this war." It was resolved by the conference to take such steps as may be necessary to carry the above decision into effect. The statement advised all labor organizations to be prepared to send their leaders to London to instruct their members to lay down their tools. A committee of action, appointed by the meeting, will see Lloyd George at noon to-morrow. The conference which represented the whole field of labor, is regarded as having presented an ultimatum to the Government threatening direct action.

A WAITING POLICY.

HYTHE, Aug. 9.
The Hythe Conference, hurriedly called Sunday, to consider means for saving Poland from the Bolshevik menace, ended to-day with an agreement between Premier Lloyd George and Premier Millerand, on the aid to be given the new Polish State. After the Premier had decided to reimpose the blockade on Russia, and to furnish munitions and technical advice to Poland, Lloyd George succeeded in getting M. Millerand to consent to withhold the application of aid until after the preliminary results of the conferences at Minsk, between Bolshevik and Polish representatives, are known. M. Millerand, who had been firm in urging a French policy, which included blockade and strong defensive measures, was obliged to yield somewhat to the milder policy of

Lloyd George, who was determined that no Allied troops should be used in Poland. The establishment of a defensive line in Poland, which was considered by the conference, it carried out according to opinion expressed here, would be regarded by British and French as more than a plan to defend Poland. It would, in effect, "be a cordon sanitaire" to keep the Bolshevik from Western Europe, but from what happened at the closing moments of the conference, it is considered that much will depend upon the Bolshevik at Minsk.

IRONICAL THANKS.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 10.
A large meeting of Irishmen, convened to protest against the Government's treatment of Archbishop Mannix, passed a resolution thanking the Government "for helping the cause of Ireland by its action toward Archbishop Mannix." It was stated that the publicity given the Mannix incident saved the propaganda funds thousands of pounds.

ARCHBISHOP MANNIX IN LONDON.

LONDON, Aug. 10.
Archbishop Mannix arrived here at six o'clock this morning, and was met by only a handful of Priests and a few followers. Only a few people knew he was to arrive at an early hour. He was driven to the home of a Priest in the suburbs.

TURKS DELAY TREATY.

PARIS, Aug. 10.
The signature of the Turkish Peace Treaty, already delayed several times, is again postponed, this time it is reported because the Turks stipulate that Allies be in agreement.

RUSSIAN SUCCESS.

PARIS, Aug. 10.
Russians have captured Ciechanow, thus cutting the Warsaw-Danzig railway, according to reports received by the Foreign Office to-day.

OUT OF COMMISSION.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.
Five captive German warships arrived here yesterday, and, after being exhibited twelve months, will be sunk.

Police Court.

A domestic accused of taking the sum of \$35.00 from a business man pleaded not guilty to the charge, but admitted taking \$4.00 from a till, claiming that her employer threatened to stop 25 cents of her wages every morning that she overslept herself, and that he then owed her this amount. The owner of the store took the goods which was bought with the \$4, so the case was dismissed.

A boy, the size of a tom-tit, and respectfully dressed, who was accused of stealing the sum of \$10 from the store of a Cabot Street grocer, was ordered to be bailed. This boy, although diminutive in size, has done big stunts, among which were stealing a saddle horse, and house breaking. In the present case the boy got out of bed at 2 o'clock the morning before the races and mounting a ladder entered the store and stole the money from the till, afterwards spending a good time at the course. He had since taken to the woods and only turned up at home last night, where he was arrested.

In the case of a breach of the Prohibition Act, in which a steward on a local ship was charged with being the importer and seller of liquor, Mr. Higgins for the defence objected, but the original charge being changed to one of importation, he pleaded guilty, and asked that the court consider that the voluntary agent of the defendant was fined \$100 not long ago and the fine had to be paid by this defendant. There was nothing to do in the matter, however, and a fine of \$100 was imposed.

An assault case between two Chinamen was withdrawn.
A sailor who was charged with keeping a vicious monkey pleaded not guilty. The woman who made the charge subsequently agreed that she had summoned the wrong party and the defendant was dismissed.

A resident of Merrymeeting Road, who was charged with assaulting a woman of that section a few days ago, pleaded not guilty, and through his counsel, Mr. Higgins, stated that some method be adopted to stop the form of vendetta now going on there. The woman was hit while the defendant was fighting with her father, who it seems was helped out by the daughter. The case was dismissed.

A boy charged with trampling on the potato beds of Ex-Head Constable Dave's garden was dismissed, as he had only gone over the fence to get his ball.
