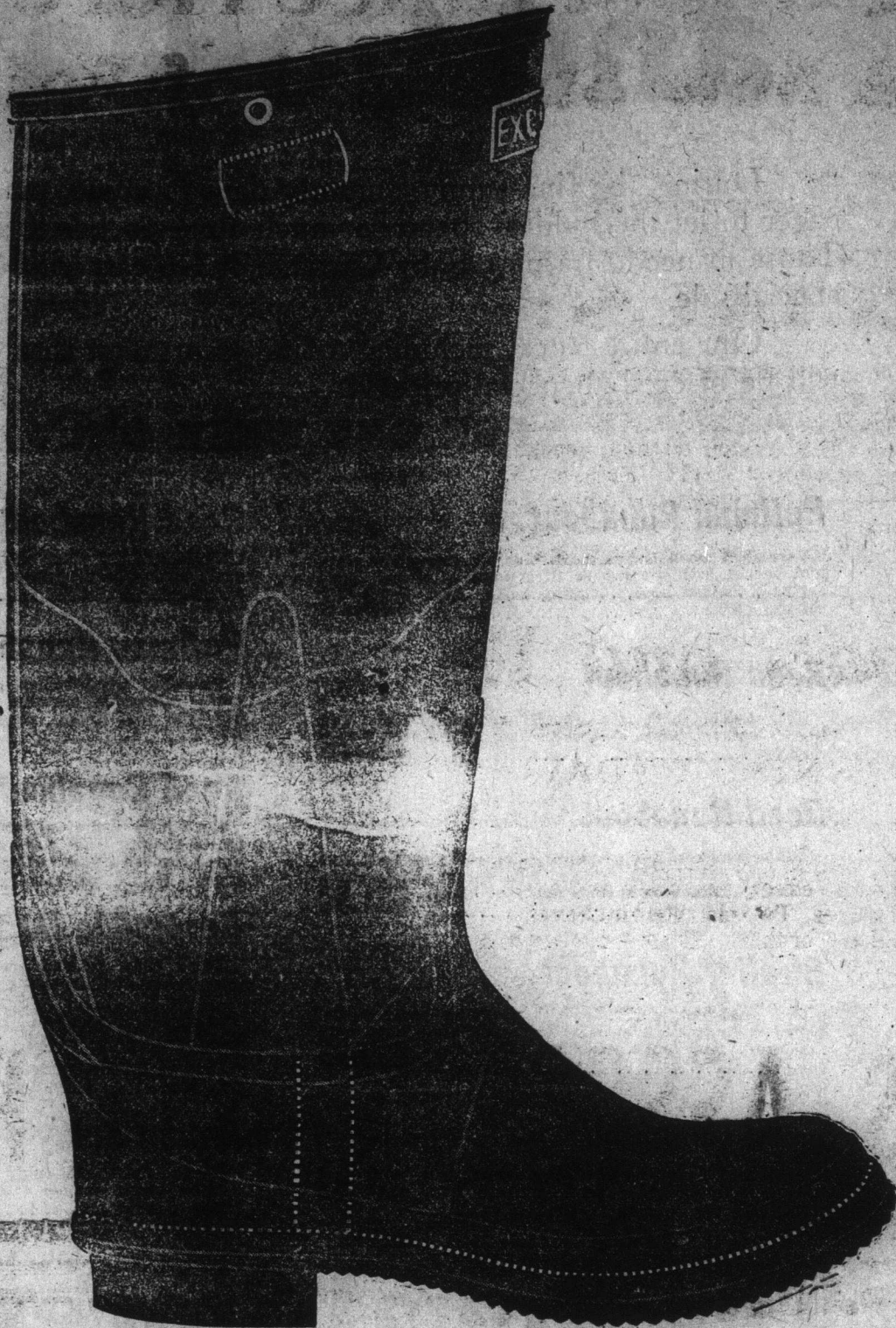

By the English mail this week we learn that some visitors of great importance to our cod-oil trade will visit Newfoundland this summer. The University of London is sending out one of their principal chemical professors, and the Lester Institute is doing likewise. They will be accompanied by a Biologist sent out by the British Ministry of Fisheries. For many years Norwegian codliver oil has been receiving the preference from the British medical profession in consumptive cases, etc., but now it would appear that Newfoundland is coming into her own at last. DIFFERENT TASTES.

I like to sit by a spreading tree a day after day you may see me there!—and read of perils on land and sea, of heroes bold and of damsels fair. I read my books till the long day 'goes, and the shadows lengthen on field and fane; I see with their going 'toils, wonder what they can see in the wad, and he goes away on tramp; he sends me other cat; I'll watch him, and I sit

and letters sealed with unholy stamps. And he might sit 'neath a stately yew, with a good warm book and a stogie fat; but off he travels to Timbuctoo—I wonder what he can see in that! And some go off to the sombre woods, to picnic there, on the grass to lie, to eat stale doughnuts and kindred goods, and get their feet in the sundard pie; I see them go with their baskets big, to the dark abode of the bog and bat, where the skeletons stand—and the chiggers chig—I wonder what they can see in that! The joy of one makes another sick, the fun of James is a grief to me; give me a volume that has a kick, a tale of perils on land and sea! Then James may off to the jungle speed to chase a tiger or other cat; I'll watch him, and I sit

and read, and wonder what he can see in that.

Household Notes.

Ammonia will remove iodine spots. Stains on marble can be removed with benzene. Hard-boiled eggs and celery make a delicious salad. Tomato sauce should be served with real timbales. Individual strawberry shortcakes are nice served hot. While drying sweaters should be reshaped frequently. Serve strips of stewed green and red peppers with fish. Pieces of dill pickled on the bottom of tin bread boxes will prevent them from rusting. New potatoes and peas are sometimes creamed together. Garnish cold tongue with watercress and sliced oranges. Every bit of left-over fruit should be made into jam. Shrimps are excellent fried and served with sauce tartare. A delicious gelatine loaf may be made with salmon and rice. Red or green sweet peppers are attractive in pineapple salad.

A few drops of oil of peppermint favor apple jelly delightfully. Quince jelly makes an attractive garnish for cream cheese salad. Iced cherry soup is very attractive. Serve it with bread sticks. If you must put your hands into dirty water, wear canvas gloves. When making ice cream, use one part salt to three parts finely cracked ice. Chopped pineapple and oranges make a delicious fruit dish for breakfast. White kid shoes may be cleaned by scrubbing with Ivory soap and water. For children who are tired of plain oatmeal, cook with cereal with raisins. A strawberry huller is just the thing for picking feathers out of a chicken.
