A diet suitable for a child of 2 to years: Breakfast, cereal, an egg (boiled), bread, butter, milk; dinner, meat, potato, green vegetable, bread butter, dessert (custard); supper, cereal, milk, crackers, fruit (apple, baked).

A diet on which a boy of nine years

weighing 66 pounds, thrived: Breakfast, toast (3 pieces), butter (1-2 oz.), sugar (1-4 ounce), cereal (3 ounces), 1 egg), cocoa (a cupful); dinner, a cup broth, meat (2 ounces), green vegetable (3 ounces), rice (3 ounces) bread (2 slices), butter (1-2 ounce) dessert (custard, 4 ounces); supper toast (3 slices), one egg, butter (1-2 ounce), milk (a tumblerful), a baked apple, (one level teaspoonful equals half an ounce.)
