Dr. Sangster's Case.

For some time past the public have been treated to a great many articles and letters in the Toronto and other papers on Dr. Sangster's candidature as the Teachers' representative at the Council of Public Instruction. His private life and family troubles have been paraded day after day. The scandal about his treatment of his first wife, the procuring of a divorce—said to be a sham one—and his subsequent marriage to a young lady, to whom it is said he had been paying his attentions before he was separated from his first wife, are now well known to all readers, and are the subject of daily comment. In view of all these disclosures, we think the teachers of Ontario should pause before they commit themselves, and choose him as their representative. We are glad to notice that many of them are beginning to reflect upon the results which would follow from such a course, and the disgrace which would attach to their election of a man of Dr. Sangster's questionable character. For after the statements which have been made about his family relations, and which have not been denied, and after the disclosures of other matters affecting his moral character, we think that Dr. Sangster should be the last man to seek for such a position, and that the Teachers should seek elsewhere for a representative whose private record is above reproach, and whose character has not been tarnished like Dr. Sangster's.

It can be proved on oral and written testimony that Dr. Sangster was paying attentions to his present wife in 1867; that he wrote letters in 1869 to his first wife, abusing and threatening her, and proposing that she should leave him and he would give her an allowance, but made no allusion to drunkenness or adultery. Mrs. Sangster agreed on separating, and in the fall of that year left her husband's home. A month or so after, he proposed marriage to his second wife, much to the disapprobation of her parents. Dr. Sangster wrote a letter threatening Mr. McCausland, his second wife's father, with a civil suit if he did not cease complaining of and misrepresenting his conduct. This letter was laid before Dr. Ryerson with evidence of Dr. Sangster's questionable proceedings. Dr. Ryerson got the affair compromised and promised that intercourse between the parties should cease. In February, 1871, Dr. Sangster wrote Miss McCausland, asking her to leave the country with him, and promising to get a divorce. That letter was taken to Dr. Ryerson, and, with other documents, retained by him. In August the two left Toronto, and in September, it is said, they were married in Detroit. The statement that after Mrs. Sangster separated from her husband they lived apart, and that during that time she had a child, is without foundation. There is no evidence that Dr. Sangster ever secured a divorce in the States. It is painful to drag such facts before the public, but Dr. Sangster alone is to blame for this. Had he not taken the field as a candidate, this painful record of family infelicity, and subsequent attempts to square his actions by the very loose laws of the United States, might have remained in obscurity. He courted publicity, and has evoked a tale of wrong-doing which ought to bring a blush of shame to the cheek of any man who has regard for a good name and an irreproachable character.

Considering all the circumstances, the Teachers of Ontario may be well assured that they are acting in accordance with public sentiment if they reject Dr. Sangster. There are other men well qualified for the office, such as Goldwin Smith, who is getting considerable support among the Teachers; Judge Macdonald, of Guelph, who is well qualified to be a representative; the Rev. Mr. Barwash, late of Victoria College, and others whose names are mentioned, and whose capabilities are being freely canvassed.

The new Municipal Act is a very stringent one. Its 196th section provides that no member of any Council, city, town, or township, shall receive any money from the Treasurer for any work performed or to be performed. This will prevent councillors from doing any work whatever for corporation after election. They can have no contract with a corporation before their election, nor have any money claim against afterwards. The Treasurer cannot now legally pay any money to a councillor for work of any kind performed or to be performed, and if he does so in defiance of the statute, he renders himself liable to serious pains and penalties.

The Conservatives of South Wentworth are already making a move towards organization in view of the next election for the Local Legislature, and the Dundas Banner advises the Reformers to follow their example.

The London Free Press admits that Mr. Mackenzie's administration of the existing public works may be marked with prudence, if not with genius.

THE HERALD AND THE FARM.—The Herald, in an article on our statement made on Thursday that the Rev. W. F. Clarke had resigned the Rectorship at the Provincial Farm, and that matter there were in an unsatisfactory state, takes occasion to indulge in a series of misrepresentations, some of which are as far from the truth as possibly can be. Individuals who have interested themselves in the Institution are grossly misrepresented, their actions misrepresented and their motives impugned. In the present state of matters we decline to enter into any discussion with the Herald on the subject, but will take occasion at an early day to answer many of its most important charges, and lay the facts before the public.

THE GRAND TRUNK.—A despatch from London brings the news that Mr. Sergeant, Manager of the South Devon Railway, has been appointed Manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, in room of Mr. Brydges.

The Manitoba Legislature re-assembled on Friday for the despatch of business, being the last session of the first Parliament, at the conclusion of which a general election will take place.

The Halifax Recorder says:—Sir John, though out of power, cannot leave Ottawa. Dr. Tupper—out of power—threatens to make it the sphere of his professional practice. Hon. Mr. O'Connor—out of the Government, and out of Parliament as well—opens his law office there. And now we are told that ex-Speaker Cockburn, having lost both his office and his seat in the House, proposes to commence his professional business in Ottawa. How the moths will continue to flutter around the flame that has already singed their wings.

The Reformers of North Oxford have inaugurated the political picnic season, by making arrangements for a grand demonstration, to be held in Hon. George Alexander's grove on Friday, the 19th inst., in honour of the representative of the Riding, Hon. Oliver Mowat and Mr. Thomas Oliver. The principal speaker will be Hon. S. Huntington, whom the people of Western Canada will be delighted to hear. Messrs. Blake, Mackenzie, and a number of other leading politicians, have also been invited. The affair promises to be a great success.
