British Headquarters in France, Oct. 4.—On Wednesday one British aviator dispersed 500 German troops with his machine gun, and four airplanes engaged nine German Albatross scouts The Britishers brought down one enemy machine which crashed to the ground, downed another one in flames and three completely out of control-Innumerable bombing raids have been carried out by both sides in the past few days. The bright moonlight nights have been specially favorable for this work, and after dark the air has been filled with machines from both sides.
