An Icicle 1,000 Feet Long.
[From the Seattle Telegran.]

On Monday last a loud noise and slight shaking of the earth caused no little wonderment among residents near the hills. Investigation proved the cause to be an ice slide. A small and innocent spring issued from the side of one of the mountains, its waters spreading and flowing over a steep incline of rock. During the past winter months ice formed against this wall of stone, increasing in size until the vast icicle, fully 20 feet in thickness and 1,000 feet in length, projected into the valley below. From the warmth of the sun and its own weight it released its hold and thundered down the mountain side, carrying everything before it, even trees three feet in diameter. Those who have visited the place say that the foot of the cliff presents a mass of broken ice, rtees, limbs and earth 50 feet in height. This is a repetition of occasional similar occurrences in previous years, but on a grander scale.
