NO GERRYMANDER.

La Minerve, the newspaper mouthof Mr. Ouimet, the high tax leader in Quebec, continues to assert that Quebec was not submitted to a sufficient gerrymander in 1892, and that a new cutting and carving of the constituencies must take place before the ensuing general election. This advocacy of an interim gerrymander undoubtedly proves that Mr. Ouimet is cognizant of the fact that the present Administration cannot again be returned to power unless foul means are adopted. Let the men in power at Ottawa insist on the gerrymander scheme if they will. They will find that Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and those who follow his lead have enough strength in Parliament to prevent its passage during the life of the present Administration. And the people generally would indorse their attitude of

hostility.

ESTABLISH A WESTERN PRISON. The grand jury at Toronto called the attention of the Government to the overcrowding of the Central Prison in that city. No doubt some action will result. As a large number of the prisoners are taken from Western Ontario, the best means to relieve the overcrowding would be to reconstruct the London jail, now never filled to its limit, and arrange to have a provincial place of confinement for Western Ontario established here. There is really no reason why the Central Prison should be enlarged, and prisoners from the west be taken long distances to it for punishment, when so workable a plan for relieving that place of confinement can be devised for a less expenditure of public money. The enlargement of the London jail by the taking in of the comparatively vacant lands surrounding it would provide all the room necessary.

THEY IGNORE THEIR LEADER, Premier Bowell is apparently unable to control members of his Cabinet. The men who ought to be his subordinates keep taking up attitudes contrary to what he declares to be the policy of his Administration, and cause the old man no end of trouble. There was a vacancy in the Supreme Court, the other day, and Messrs. Ouimet, Tupper and Caron offered it to one Quebec lawyer while Premier Bowell himself wrote to another Quebec lawyer, urging him to accept it. Much speculation now exists as to what the men in power would have done if both lawyers had accepted the one position.

This incident is a repetition of what took place in Ottawa last session, when a Minister in the Commons stated the Government policy in regard to the Hudson Bay Railway scheme to be one thing, and the Conservative leader told the Senate, an hour or two afterwards, that it was something entirely different.

How can a Government stand whose members are constantly fighting among themselves?

MADILL WANTS LISTER DE-FEATED.

Rev. Mr. Madill, chief of the P. P. A., who worked so hard to secure the defeat of Sir Oliver Mowat, is still at work endeavoring to defeat Liberal M. P.s. He appeared at a gathering in Forest the other day and announced that he and his friends had no use for Lister, and that he must be defeated at all hazards.

Sarnia needs a new postoffice, and Mr. Madill asserts that it has not got It because the electors, being true to their conscientious convictions, have sent Mr. Lister to Parliament instead of a supporter of the men in power, whose views they could not honestly indorse. The P. P. A. leader, therefore, wishes Mr. Lister to be defeated. and if possible to have the Conservative party triumph. To secure this end. a so-called "independent" candidate is meanwhile put in the field, and it is expected that by this means the corrupt dispensers of postoffices may slip in their candidate!

This is a nice, convenient arrangement for the P. P. A.-Conservative combine, but the electors of West Lambton have surely had their eyes opened to the true position of affairs

FASHION AND TRADE.

Fashion is again bringing prosperity to Bradford, as it has in times past brought idleness to the wheels and hunger to the inhabitants. Twothirds of the mohair of the world is manufactured into weaving material in Bradford, and a recovery of a longlost popularity by mohair and lustre goods has created a tremendous demand for the products of Bradford. and sent up the price of mohair from 24 to 64 cents a pound, and of the yarn from 48 cents to \$1 03 a pound. most incredible fortunes have been made by firms that had large quantities of mohair on hand when the boom began. A few years ago Bradford was prostrated because the fashion decreed the use of soft, lustreless fabrics. Of course, to a certain extent Bradford could learn to make these, but this only slightly mitigated the blow; the channels of trade, the arts of operatives and the styles of machinery do not change so readily as the whims of fashion, and Bradford went into a deep eclipse. There is a tradition in England that the makers of shell combs were brought to the verge of starvation by a change in fashion, which sent all existing combs into retirement and stopped abruptly the sale of more. The situation being explained to the Queen, she benevolently appeared in public with shell combs, and the business recovered its prosperity. Four or five years ago an English actress appeared on a New York stage with a straw hat that was a novelty. A manufacturer took note of the style, and in a few days had the trade supplied with its reproductions. It proved popular, and though he was protected by no registration of the design or other legal discourager of imitation, he made \$32,000 net profit that season on that particular style of hat. 


